COURSE DESCRIPTION

From the SLCC Catalog:

This is an introduction to the purpose, media and techniques of the visual arts. It provides a perspective into its development in past and current cultures. Included is a study of principles, elements of art. There is some hands-on producing of art and students tour an art museum. This is not a study of all art created since the beginning of time. The goal is to facilitate intelligent discussion.

From the Instructor:

This course offers a glimpse into the world of visual art to the non-art major. It provides a historical perspective on the development of the visual arts in past and contemporary cultures. Students will learn the principles and elements of art; the various media artists use, and the techniques of art. ART 1010 is designed to introduce some of the issues related to how we view, analyze, and understand art. The goal is to facilitate intelligent critique and discussion of art. This course fulfills the Fine Arts (FA) requirement for General Education.

This particular class has been designed with a simple instructional template to help ensure its success as an asynchronous online course. As with most college-level online courses, we will rely heavily on the text. *Understanding Art*, by Lois Fichner-Rathus, has twenty-two chapters that will be examined over the course of the semester. It is included in Canvas via Follett Discover.
