Course Description

From the Catalog:

This course examines the important contribution of photography and photographers in the field of art. Students will learn basic operations of a digital or film SLR camera (which is required for the course), perform shooting assignments, learn visual rules of composition, and conduct research. For non-art/photography majors.

From the Instructor:

This general education course will introduce the student to the art, mechanics, applications, and history of photography. It will also explain the important contributions that photography and photographers have made to the field of art. Students will learn the basic history, ethical concerns, and social impact of photography and how to gain an appreciation and understanding of art in general.

Special Note: A D-SLR (Single-Lens Reflex) or Mirrorless camera with adjustable settings is required for this class.

General Education Statement

This course fulfills the Fine Art requirement for the General Education Program at Salt Lake Community College. It is designed not only to teach the information and skills required by the discipline, but also to develop vital workplace skills and to teach strategies and skills that can be used for life-long learning. General Education courses teach basic skills as well as broaden a student's knowledge of a wide range of subjects. Education is much more than the acquisition of facts; it is being able to use information in meaningful ways in order to enrich one's life.

While the subject of each course is important and useful, we become truly educated through making connections of such varied information with the different methods of organizing human experience that are practiced by different disciplines. Therefore, this course, when combined with other General Education courses, will enable you to develop broader perspectives and deeper understandings of your community and the world, as well as challenge previously held assumptions about the world and its inhabitants.

General Education ePortfolio

Your General Education ePortfolio tells your SLCC learning story. This assignment will be the last assignment you complete in this class and will represent your best photographic work.
