Course Description:

This hands-on course focuses on printmaking as a means of communication and expression. An etching press will be used to print photopolymer Solarplates, monotypes and relief plates. The power of the printed image to influence social and cultural change will be explored. Using principles and elements of design, students will produce prints that creatively express their opinions, views and emotions.

Prerequisite: None

You will study the connection between the art of printmaking and society. This will provide you with opportunities to understand and respect different cultures and their artistic expressions. You will use the artistic process and forms of artistic expression to depict and express human experience, emotions and thought by means of verbal, visual and aural images, metaphors and design.

General Education Statement

This course fulfills the Fine Art requirement for the General Education Program at Salt Lake Community College. It is designed not only to teach the information and skills required by the discipline, but also to develop vital workplace skills and to teach strategies and skills that can be used for life-long learning. General Education courses teach basic skills as well as broaden a student's knowledge of a wide range of subjects. Education is much more than the acquisition of facts; it is being able to use information in meaningful ways in order to enrich one's life.

While each course's subject is important and useful, we become truly educated by connecting such varied information with the different methods of organizing human experience practiced by different disciplines. Therefore, this course, when combined with other General Education courses, will enable you to develop broader perspectives and deeper understandings of your community and the world and challenge previously held assumptions about the world and its inhabitants.

Signature Assignment

You will study propaganda art in the context of printmaking and the distribution of multiple copies. You will analyze the influence that propaganda has had on past and current cultures. The signature project for this course is to **Design & Print a Propaganda Poster** based on a current political or social issue. You will compose a design that makes a statement or expresses your opinion on the issue. The posters will be printed using one or more of the printmaking techniques learned during the semester. You will post a digital copy of your poster in your ePortfolio, along with an artist's statement and reflection essay.

Course Learning Outcomes

- Analyze ways in which visual art inspires and is inspired by other forms of art, such as music, film, and written texts, including poetry and novels.
- Analyze and evaluate printed artworks during discussions, critiques, presentations, and written assignments, demonstrating knowledge of printmaking terminology and the principles and elements of design.
- Evaluate historical and contemporary printmaking and identify the emotions, issues, themes, morals, and social concerns they convey.
- Apply problem-solving skills and use the creative process to conceptualize an idea and successfully manipulate visual media to achieve a specific goal in visual communication.
- Demonstrate competency and craftsmanship in producing a body of prints using relief, intaglio, and monotype printmaking techniques.
- Identify printmaking organizations and resources and visit local printmaking establishments and exhibits.
- Demonstrate skill and knowledge in the printmaking studio by safely and properly using printmaking tools, materials, inks, and papers, as well as plate preparation, registration, and press usage.

CLASS POLICIES

The instructor will not award "I" grades to non-participating students. Withdrawing from the course and other matters of registration for and/or dropping the class is the student's responsibility.

Attendance: *(23% of Final Grade)* To be successful in this class, you must attend all classes and be on time! Class demonstrations that cover important information are a major part of the course. It is imperative that you be present and punctual at these demonstrations! The instructor will not repeat demonstrations for students that are late or do not attend class. If you must miss class or be late, it is your responsibility to obtain missed information from a reliable classmate. Roll will be taken each class period. You can earn up to 8 points for each class that you attend, are punctual, and participate.

Incomplete Grade Policy As per college policy, incomplete grades will be granted only for work unavoidably missed at the semester's end and only if 70% of the coursework has been completed. (Unavoidable meaning serious illness, family death or other dire occurrence) An incomplete grade must be resolved within the time

agreed upon by the instructor. If the required work to complete the course and to remove the incomplete grade is not submitted by the specified deadline, the incomplete grade is changed automatically to a grade of **F**.

Tests (10% of Final Grade) Tests are given during class time and students must be present at the time of a test to get credit. If a student is absent on a test day they will not be allowed to take the test later. If a test must be missed, the student has the opportunity to make up the points missed by completing one of the Extra Credit options listed on the course Canvas site.

Late Work Projects can be submitted late with a 10% reduction of total possible points for 7 days after the due date and 20% reduction for 8 to 14 days from the due date. Projects will not be accepted after two weeks (14 days) from the due date. At that time, the student will receive the grade of "0" points.
