This course utilizes online course content with regular classroom sessions. Course Description

Techniques to photograph informal, formal, and environmental portraits. Produce aesthetic portraits in the studio or location utilizing electronic flash. Refine posing, composition and conceptual aspects for dramatic portraits of people.

Course Prerequisite: ART-2310 Photographic Light 2 (or taken concurrently.)

Course Objectives & Learning Outcomes

- Utilize photographic process to produce quality portraits demonstrating digital or analog image capture with all camera formats. CWSLO-1,2,3,5,6,7,8
- Implement application of informal, formal, and environmental portrait for producing expressive photographs of people. CWSLO- 1,2,3,5,6,7
- Demonstrate aesthetic and creative portrait lighting applying the following specifics: Utilize studio electronic flash equipment to produce portrait photographs in studio and location environments. Refine use of light to enhance all aspects of visual communication and portrait aesthetics. Compare and implement traditional portrait lighting concepts with non-traditional lighting. Demonstrate Butterfly, Rembrandt, Loop, Split, and Rim lighting. Apply Broad Light, Short Light, High Key, and Low Key lighting. Implement Key light, Fill light, Hair light, Kicker light, Back Ground light, and Catch light. CWSLO-1,2,3,5,6,7,8
- Realize and perform portrait arrangements with essential posing techniques to include the following: Implement progressive portrait
 arrangements and composition. Perform various posing techniques for different situations of location, studio, groups, and individual subjects.
 Illustrate various portrait point of views of subjects with various subject orientation; straight at camera through profile posing positions.
 Determine and capture subtle changes in subject expression and gesture. Formulate posing solutions for of various body types and shapes.
 Demonstrate professional ethics and communication proficiency with portrait subjects. CWSLO- 1,2,3,5,6
- Demonstrate professional quality photographic printing and presentation ability to include the following: Refine printing skill, skin tone, and
 color evaluation. Compare albums, photo books, print surfaces of textured paper or canvas common to the portrait industry. CWSLO- 1,2,3,6,7
- Apply professional industry ethics to all aspects of the portrait process including the following: Interpret talent releases, rights of others and
 photographic liability associated for image reproduction in print, electronic formats, or world wide web. Evaluate portrait artist perspectives via



Constructive participation in class lectures, demonstrations, labs, discussions, and assignment critiques are required to improve critical thinking and photographic ability.

Attendance in class sessions is according to the Department of Visual Art & Design policy and applies to this course. Missing more than 6 class sessions may result in a failing grade. 3 late classes = 1 class session absence.

All assignments for this course must be produced during this semester. Students must perform their own work throughout the course. Assignments are expected at beginning of class on specific due date. Assignments are given weekly at the beginning of class by the instructor and have one week time period to complete. Any assignment turned in late will receive maximum half credit of the assignment's original specific credit. All assignments may be re-done to improve grade/ credit. It is students' responsibility to obtain missed lecture information and assignments. Students are expected to follow all classroom and computer lab policies. Failure to do so may result in termination from course without refund and a failing grade. Students may not bring kids, friends or family to class. Do not use phones and text messaging during lectures, critiques, or demonstrations. Students can expect to spend 4-10 hours outside of class time preparing for class and assignments.
