CJ 1330: Criminal Law

Course Description

Students will learn the sources of law, historical origins of law, functions of law in society, elements of a crime, interpretation of laws by the judicial system, classifications of crime, terms of imprisonment, and criminal defenses. Students will analyze mock scenarios to determine if a crime occurred.

Recommended Course Prerequisite

CJ 1010: Introduction to Criminal Justice

Course Learning Outcomes

Students will describe the sources of law.

Students will describe the historical origins of law.

Students will describe functions of law in society.

Students will identify elements of a crime.

Students will identify how laws have been applied by the judicial system.

Students will describe criminal defenses.

Students will analyze mock scenarios to determine if a crime has occurred, including the classification of the crime and terms of imprisonment.
