The NDG Linux Essentials course is designed to prepare you for the Linux Professional Institute Linux Essentials Professional Development Certificate, which validates a demonstrated understanding of:

- Apply Basic concepts of hardware, processes, programs and the components of the Linux Operating System
- Apply the command line and with files.
- Create and restore compressed backups and archives.
- Develop System security, users/groups and file permissions for public and private directories.
- Create and run simple scripts.
