Dental Hygiene Theory I

Course Description

Introductory course to practice of dental hygiene. Students learn principles and theory of infection control, medical & dental histories, extra/intra-oral assessments, management of medical emergencies, current instrumentation and operatory management.

Prerequisite: Accepted and enrolled in the Dental Hygiene program. Corequisite: DH 1110 Semester(s): Fall

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- List the procedures that are expected of a dental hygienist during a medical emergency and be able to identify the different types of dental/medical emergencies.
- Describe personal protection of the dental practitioner in treating patients, including the rationale for universal precautions and the use of various barriers for infection control.
- List infection control procedures in the clinical setting, including methods of disinfection and sterilization and the advantages and disadvantages of each.
- Describe operator and patient positioning for optimal, ergonomic, safe dental hygiene practice.
- Describe communication strategies to effectively convey information and instruction to patients.
- Discuss the elements and relevance of proper documentation of patient information during the assessment stage of treatment, including completion of a caries/restorative dental chart and a periodontal exam and chart.
- Discuss the principles of disease transmission and the protocol for infection control in the dental environment.
- Discuss the rationale for comprehensive medical histories, the components of the medical history, and the communication skills associated with proper procedures for taking a medical history.
- Explain the professional roles of the dental hygienist, including types of services performed, ethical considerations, and core values.
- Identify the vital signs, their respective normal range values, and the factors that influence each vital sign; describe the procedure used to determine patient vital signs.
- Describe the extraoral and intraoral examination methods, sequencing, and normal expectations, including documentation of findings and differentiation between normal and abnormal findings.
- Distinguish between the various examination and scaling instruments in terms of design and indication for use.

- Describe instrumentation grasps, fulcrum procedures, angulation, adaptation, activation and exercises for dexterity.
- Recognize and explain evidence-based dental hygiene practice.
- Summarize selective polishing and its indications.
- Classify the different types of fluorides including indications, usage, contraindications, limitations, protocol for toxicity.
- Discuss sealants, their indications and contraindications. Explain the process for applying, curing, and finishing sealants.
- Identify and describe the anatomy and function of the periodontium.
- Describe and discuss the acquired pellicle, dental biofilm, material alba, and calculus.
- Discuss the basic principles of instrumentation and the techniques that apply to mirror use, probing, exploring, and scaling.
- Identify methods for evaluation of complete calculus deposit removal, differentiating between vertical, oblique, and horizontal strokes.
- Describe and discuss gingival and periodontal infections, and their contributing factors.

Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

- The <u>Dental Hygienist License (DOPL)</u> assignment (1) is to assist the student in gaining a better understanding of how the licensed dental hygiene professional may practice in the state of Utah. It will be submitted through Canvas by September 25th by 11:59 PM. A guideline with questions for the student to answer is provided.
- <u>Community Service-Learning Reflection</u> (1) incorporate civic engagement and critical reflective thinking. A service-learning reflection will summarize the student experience while providing service related to oral health (6 hours). The experience should be with a community organization that promotes oral health and/or the profession of Dental Hygiene. The reflection of the community service-learning experience is due by the last day of lecture using a provided rubric and writing prompts.

- Each student will be assigned a possible <u>Medical Emergency/Consideration</u> that may be encountered while treating patients. The student will prepare an 8-10 minute presentation to give to the class. A guideline, study guide, example outline, and rubric are provided.
- <u>Weekly Homework</u> assignments (14) will strengthen the student's critical thinking skills and knowledge through assigned reading in the course texts. Homework is due before class the following week and should be uploaded into the appropriate assignment area in Canvas.
- Weekly <u>Online Quizzes</u> (13) will be used to summarize and review the weekly reading material. They consist of 20-30 questions are given in Canvas. They are open book and should be completed independently from other students. They are designed to assist the student in learning and preparation for exams. They are due by the following week.
- A <u>Midterm Exam</u> will cover all material up until the exam date. It will consist of approximately 109 multiple-choice, multiple answers, true/false, matching, and fillin-the-blank(s) questions with one extra credit (110 total). It will be given in the assessment center.
- A <u>Final Exam</u> will be comprehensive and consist of approximately 108 (120 points) multiple-choice, multiple answers, true/false, matching, and fill-in-the-blank(s) questions. The exam will cover information presented in reading assignments, homework, and lecture notes. The final exam will be given in the assessment center.






