
• Correctly pronounce and spell all anatomical terms for each figure.

- Create mnemonics or memory aids to remember anatomical terms and/or landmarks.
- Identify malfunctioning muscles based on clinical analysis.
- Demonstrate the pathway in which pain signals are carried from the mouth to the brain.
- Evaluate why certain anatomical features help to prevent health complications.
- Predict the physical manifestations of a malfunctioning temporomandibular joint.

Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

- An <u>Anatomy Learning Project</u> will be used to bring creativity to learning. Students
 will work in groups of 2-3 and be assigned one of the following sections:
 - Skeletal System (skull bones/facial bones)
 - Skeletal System (facial bones/paranasal sinuses/skull fossae/cervical bones)
 - Muscular System
 - Vascular System
 - Glandular Tissue
 - Nervous System

- As a group, students will provide a 10-15 minute review of the assigned section.
 The approach is
 to include a way for the class to remember the material. Creativity is key! Use of
 mnemonics, songs, or other activities are encouraged. Projects will be presented to
 the class following the lecture of the associated material. See Canvas grading
- <u>Case Studies</u> (8) are used to test the students' ability to apply course concepts to the assessment of a patient in clinical practice. Eight different case studies will be

- presented in Canvas. Submittal of all case studies are due by November 22nd at 11:59 PM.
- Weekly <u>Online Chapter Quizzes</u> (13) will be used to summarize and review the chapter information covered in each lecture. They are given in Canvas and are open book, but not open classmate. They are designed to assist the student in learning and preparation for exams. They are due the following Tuesday at 11:59 PM.
- Identification Quizzes (7) will be administered at the beginning of most class sessions and be used to test the students' ability to locate/identify and compare anatomical regions/structures of the head and neck. The quizzes will cover the previous weeks' chapter material and consist of drawings, photos, and/or models of the head and neck regions/structures. The student must be able label structures/regions while using correct spelling.
- <u>Section Exams</u> (4) will be used to summarize and reinforce information from the following chapter sections: 1-3, 4-6, 7-9, and 10-12. Section exams are given during class time but are scheduled in the assessment center. They consist of multiple-choice questions, labeling, and fill-in-the-blank.
- A <u>Final Exam</u> will be comprehensive and consist of approximately 100 multiplechoice, matching and labeling questions. Exam will cover information presented in reading assignments, homework, and lecture notes. The final exam will be given in the assessment center.
