<u>Macroeconomics</u>: "The study of the behavior of the economy as a whole, including such economywide phenomena as changes in unemployment, the general price level, and national income".

Since later course materials build upon knowledge from previous chapters, it's crucial for everyone to follow the order of the chapters throughout the semester. This assignment requires each of you to jot down your thoughts in response to the discussion prompt each week and to reply to your peers.

You have about 13 discussion topics this semester.

This can also serve as your weekly check-in. Unlike the "Chapter Topic Weekly Discussion", which assigns a specific topic for discussion, this assignment provides you with the opportunity to showcase your interest in economic topics and visualizations. You can select any charts containing business data to discuss here. Those who relate their charts to our class concepts will get an extra 20% credit for their weekly input. You also have about 13 "Your Chart of the Week" discussions this semester.
