Course Description

Course Description:

This course explores effective research in education and identifies ways research can be used to inform and improve educational practice. Students will learn about quantitative, qualitative, mixed methods, and action research designs as they are used in educational research.

Course Goals:

- 1. Students will understand the purpose and impact of qualitative, quantitative, mixed methods, and action research in education.
- 2. Students will understand how research affects education through assigned readings, classroom discussion, and collaborative peer projects. This understanding will help students make connections between research and its influence on classroom lesson plans and practice
- 3. Students will create individual and group research projects as well as review educational literature. This exercise will help students understand the relevance of research in connection with effective teaching practices in the United States. The project and literature reviews will define the basic principles, methods, and designs in both quantitative and qualitative research.
- 4. Students will evaluate current educational practices and analyze their own personal cultural and philosophical beliefs. This recognition and understanding of differing cultures and philosophies will help students prepare to make appropriate educational decisions in their future classrooms.

- Critically analyze contemporary educational practices, personal cultural and philosophical beliefs, and how these beliefs can impact classroom interaction with students of differing cultures or philosophies.
- Make strong connections between teaching and child development including appropriate curriculum choices in an elementary or secondary school setting using critical problem-solving skills.
- Development awareness of research bias.
- Critically analyze research studies in order to determine if the utilized methodologies and analyses were appropriate for the study.
- Understand the historical and political role of research in education and the impact that research has on current policies and procedures in elementary and secondary education.
- Engage in principled and vigorous dialogue and debates with fellow students and with seasoned educational professionals.
- Describe the potential impact, both positive and negative, that research can have on low-income and minority populations, public policy and on educational initiatives.
