Course Overview:

Our time together this semester will be a blend of reading, discussion, and handson practice in publication.

You will study the history and current trends in book publishing, hand-build a set of books, develop a working knowledge of Adobe InDesign, and practice binding and trimming a limited run of chapbooks or zines drawn from the winning submissions for SLCC's student chapbook competition.

Along with this publishing work, you will study the circulation and delivery of texts by helping to *build a public* for the chapbook competition winners with website and social media design, as well as event planning. Finally, you will work individually to create an original artist book in the delivery mode of your choice: chapbook, hand-built book structure, or digital text.

Course Goals:

- Understand the history and current trends of book publication, the technology and structure of the book, and the life and circulation of books beyond publication.
- Gain hands-on, practical experience in book design and layout, publication, and circulation.

- Collaborate in a small group to design and produce a small-run chapbook or zine project.
- Design and publish your own edition of original artist books.

Coursework:

Your work in this course will be a combination of the hands on and online, individual and collaborative, and in-class and on your own. You will join in-class and online discussions, work with others on some projects and individually on others, and work on projects both inside and outside of our class meetings in the Publication Center.
