
Intro Creative Nonfiction (HU)

Course Description

Intro to the conventions the creative nonfiction genre. Students read, analyze, and practice various forms of the essay. Creative non-fiction invites writers to make connections between personal experiences and the larger world.

Semester: Fall & Summer

Course introduces students to the various forms of creative nonfiction, including essay, lyric essay, new journalism, memoir, and flash non-fiction. Students will reflect on the contexts that shape the self, including narrative, culture, nature, and language.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Become proficient in the writing and analysis of various genres of creative nonfiction across time and cultural contexts.
- Engage with, explore, and try out emerging mediums and genres of creative nonfiction.
- Explain and explore how pluralism and diversity are explores in various genres of creative nonfiction.
- Demonstrate your understanding of major movements in creative nonfiction and how particular cultural and political moments affected those movements.
- Read and write with greater attention to structure, style, revision, and adaptation.
- Provide feedback to peers on their writing.
- Use feedback from instructor and peers in order to revise their own work.
- Participate in critical, creative, and reflective thinking through reading and writing activities.

Keys for Success (how to succeed in the course)

To be successful in this course, you should be curious and willing to try new approaches to writing. You need to do the required reading and writing before class; come to class prepared; be willing to engage in discussion; engage in critical reading and writing.
