## Course Description

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Intro to the conventions the creative nonfiction genre. Students read, analyze, and practice various forms of the essay. Creative non-fiction invites writers to make connections between personal experiences and the larger world.

- Demonstrate your understanding of major movements in creative nonfiction and how particular cultural and political moments affected those movements.
- Read and write with greater attention to structure, style, revision, and adaptation.
- Provide feedback to peers on their writing.
- Use feedback from instructor and peers in order to revise their own work.
- Participate in critical, creative, and reflective thinking through reading and writing activities.

## General Education Information

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### General Education Statement

This course fulfills the **HU** requirement for the General Education Program at Salt Lake Community College. It is designed not only to teach the information and skills required by the discipline but also to develop vital workplace skills and to teach strategies and skills that can be used for life-long learning.

## **ePortfolios**

Instructors in every general education course will ask you to put at least one assignment from the course (known as the “Signature Assignment”) into your ePortfolio and accompany it with reflective writing.

### **The Many Uses of ePortfolios**

To do this, each general education course you take at the college will ask you to demonstrate your engagement with the general education learning outcomes by designing a course-specific ePortfolio page that includes a course-specific “Signature Assignment” and reflection. When you finish your time at SLCC, your ePortfolio can provide a multimedia showcase of your educational experience and tell the story of your learning growth while at SLCC.
