When we formally study literature, we turn to literary criticism and literary theory to help us understand what we read--to find connections and patterns, uncover new ideas, and understand ourselves, the past, and the society we live in.

This course introduces you to major theoretical movements in literary history including historical literary criticism, non-Western literary criticism, and modern literary theory. We will read excerpts by Confucius, Plato, Mary Wollstonecraft, Karl Marx, Virginia Woolf, and others while studying mimesis, formalism, structuralism, feminism, gender, postcolonialism and ethnic studies.




