INTRODUCTION: Welcome to FASHION 1350. Please read this syllabus carefully, it should answer most of the questions you may have about how this course will benefit your studies with the SLCC Fashion Institute.

PREREQUISITES: none

COURSE OBJECTIVES: To provide a background in historic costume of the Western hemisphere, understand the context of each of the main periods, and apply that knowledge to present-day design.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS: Preparation by reading the assigned materials and participation in class discussions and activities is mandatory.

Timely completion of assignments is required; late assignments will only be accepted for one week past the deadline with a 25% grade reduction.

CLASS SCHEDULE AND HOMEWORK: Attached is a schedule and list of most assignments. This schedule will be followed as closely as possible however; some modifications may be necessary during the semester. You should be prepared to spend time reading the assignments and researching for your projects. These outside assignments will constitute a large portion of your grade.

Class Projects and Assignments

WEEKLY SKETCHES

For each period covered, there will be an assignment to demonstrate knowledge of the overall look and influences - this can include original sketches or scholarly images from cited sources. Full description of the assignment is in Canvas.

PROJECTS ONE & TWO

Choose two projects below. **Project one** should focus on a historic period(s) from the Ancient World through the Renaissance. **Project two** will focus on a period(s) from the 17th century to the 20th century.

HISTORIC PAPER DOLL PROJECT

For this project you get to create paper dolls using figures that are drawn with period costumes. **REQUIREMENTS:** including but not limited to:

- All illustrations must be in color (do not use crayons).
- Include one or more base figures for the costumes.
- Create 15 or more costumes.
- You can concentrate on one historic period or deign costumes that span centuries.
- How you present and engineer your paper doll is all part of the project.
- Bibliography of all sources consulted.

HISTORIC CRAFT

For this project you will get to make a small garment or produce a sewing sampler of a craft that has historical significance.

REQUIREMENTS: including but not limited to:

- Historical photocopies of the craft in context
- Historical directions/patterns (may be contemporary reprints or your own instructions)
- One written page (minimum) describing the significance of this craft in the time it originated
- A list of the original materials used and those you substituted
- Bibliography of 3 or more sources used as a reference.

COSTUME DESIGNS

Select a play, film script, musical, opera, or ballet written or set in the time periods studied to analyze and design 5 costumes (front and back):

REQUIREMENTS: including, but not limited to:

- Read the play and compile a list of potential costumes and accessories for 1 or more scenes for each character (jewelry, eye glasses, fans, crowns, shoes, hairstyles, masks, etc).
- Research the script and period and develop a research file of picture sources/inspiration.
- Create 5 fully rendered and colored costume designs for 1 or more scenes within the play.
- Bibliography of 3 or more sources used as a reference.

FASHION LINE PLAN

For this project you get to design & illustrate a fashion line plan based on a historical inspiration. **REQUIREMENTS:** including but not limited to:

- You must complete a trend or inspiration board with reference to your historical inspiration
- You will design at least 5 looks as part of your line plan including front and back color illustrations of each
- Mount all illustrations as a fashion presentation with fabric swatches included
- Bibliography of all sources consulted for your plan and inspiration board.

FASHION COMPARISON NOTEBOOK

All of today's fashions have roots in earlier costume history periods. The purpose of this project is for you to compare today's styles to their possible origins. This project can be as involved as you are willing to make it. I will give you some guidelines and then it is up to you.

SUGGESTIONS:

- The "Notebook" will be digital you may create either digital or paper pages initially. However, paper pages will need to be scanned or photographed to convert them to a digital document
- Current fashion examples can be from websites, magazines or catalogs, or some of them could be your original designs.
- The "original source" images may be from the internet, or you may photocopy from your textbook or other costume history books and library reference materials.
- Quality and presentation count more than quantity. (Although you should include at least **30** examples.)

BUT REMEMBER TO INCLUDE:

- Both the current example and the historic comparison should be labeled with the year.
- Bibliography of the sources for your historic comparisons.

E-PORTFOLIO ASSIGNMENT

During the upcoming semester, you will choose an assignment, one that you feel is your best work for this class, upload it into your ePortfolio. Write a "Reflection" answering the following questions, and post it next to your uploaded assignment choice:

- What was the assignment you chose for your e-portfolio project?
- Why did you choose this project?
- What did you learn from completing this project?
- How do you see yourself potentially using the skills and information you acquired from this project in a career in your future?

WEEKLY DISCUSSIONS & ADDITIONAL ASSIGNMENTS

Each week there will be a discussion topic and often a corresponding assignment to explore a topic related to the period of history for that unit. These will be most easily found in the course modules. Initial posts to the discussion are due on Friday of each week, and comments on colleague posts are due by Monday of that same week. Holidays may affect those due dates, so refer to Canvas and Syllabus dates for the most accurate information.
