COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces the use of industry standard CAD software for Fashion Designers. Using Gerber AccuMark V10, the student will learn how to digitize existing pattern pieces for apparel production purposes, as well as create new patterns and make numerous pattern manipulations and adjustments with AccuMark software. Class structure will consist of a demonstration and lecture followed by lab time supervised by instructor. Out of class lab time will be available for students to practice and complete homework assignments the software. Many assignments, including the Final project will be plotted out and sewn.

PREREQUISITES: Patternmaking 1100 & Beginning sewing or equivalent

COURSE GOALS & LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- True and Balance all patterns
- Maintain Fit and Accuracy.
- Familiarize students with industry standard Gerber AccuMark software.
- Successfully perform a wide range of pattern manipulations and adjustments using PDS.
- Digitize existing patterns for use in PDS – Pattern Design System
- Plot Pieces
- Create new pattern pieces and styles in PDS from basic slopers provided.
- Create Patterns from measurements or spec sheets.
- Create Models – Style Piece Lists
- The importance of sample testing before production.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Your grade will be determined on a point system by class participation and attendance, weekly quizzes, class projects, practical exams, written exams a Final Project and E- portfolio. Professional presentation, level of difficulty and neatness count.

Attendance is required for this class as instruction will be given pertinent to class material and assignments and will not be repeated. Lectures may or may not represent information acquirable from the readings or other sources. Therefore, if a student misses a class, it is his/her responsibility to make arrangements for notes from a peer. Attend class prepared to participate in discussions from Lessons. 150 Points.

- Complete weekly assignments and quizzes.
- Successfully pass the midterm 100 points and final exam 200 points.
- Exams are comprised of multiple choice, matching and fill in the blank and practical use of skills.
- Class projects:
 - T-Shirt from measurements, based on a rectangle. Test samples.
 - Decorative T- Shirt with sample.
 - 8-16 gore skirt repeating pattern based on a circle, with sample of 3 or more gores.
 - Princess Dress
 - Pockets
 - 3 Balanced skirts as assigned
 - Blouse with facings, sleeves and collar with sample.
 - Fully lined jacket with collar and lapel
 - Final Project patterns, samples.
 - Truing and balancing all work.
 - Piece Lists (models) must be connected to each Pattern no credit without
 - Spec Sheets as requested
 - E-Portfolio

Note: Late projects will be accepted the following class period with a deduction of 20%. After that they will be accepted for half credit-no exceptions. On time assignments may only be turned in during the class period in which they are due.

Assignments are open to changes by the teacher, pay attention.

CLASS SCHEDULE AND HOMEWORK

The schedule will be followed as closely as possible; however, some modifications may be necessary during the semester. Students should be prepared to spend time using the software outside of class to complete homework assignments. Homework for each week will be demonstrated during class, and assignment details will be given out in adequate time for preparation. You should be prepared to spend time outside of class completing homework as assigned. Practical assignments will be explained in class. When complete they will be plotted and sewn to test for fit design and spec accuracy. Class presentation, discussion and insights will be involved.

IMPORTANT PREREQUISITE & AUDIT INFORMATION: It is the student’s responsibility to examine each course description for details of prerequisite classes. Example: A 3 Credit Hour Class Meeting 2 days per week.

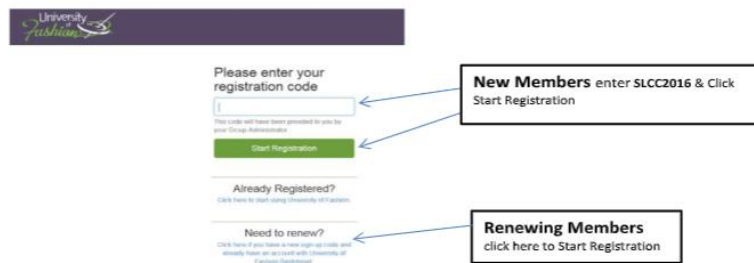

Registration Process for University of Fashion

Subscribers will need to know if they are a new or a renewing member*, the Salt Lake Community College Code, if renewing, their password and they must use their school email address to successfully register.

Class Expectations:

- All of your Class assignments must be tried and balanced with all pieces fitting together smoothly and accurately: Right angles, smooth curves, equal matching seams, notches, complete darts, smooth continuous hems, seams, pre-miters etc.
- Every assignment, practical quiz and exam must be connected in a model (computer piece list) on YOUR C:Drive/Flash Drive.
- When your assignment is complete, the model as well as each individual piece must be submitted in the proper folder on MY P:Drive to be graded. Please Label them as discussed with your name.
- All Sewn assignments will be plotted full scale and must be sewn neatly; sewing is part of your grade. No puckered dart ends etc.
- Each sewn assignment must be accompanied by a completed technical spec sheet, and cutters must list (paper piece list) with flats of front and back (not illustrations).
- Learn to use the concepts in the book to think for yourself, and create well balanced patterns which fit well, are accurate, comfortable to wear, and easy to sew.
- As you learn, you may find a better way to do something. This IS acceptable, as long as you achieve the desired outcome. Please share your method with the class.
- Most of the time when it seems like the computer is malfunctioning; it is because you are not reading the prompts on the screen. You have a single point out of place, or 2 lines that don't touch. Zoom in and find them, fix them, then move on. Don't keep pushing the button too many times without letting the computer catch up, if you do it will freeze.
- Save often! If you get stuck in one place go over the instructions carefully one at a time. Read the computer response.
- If you are still stuck, skip it and move on to the next part. Doing the same thing over and over, the same way, expecting a different result IS the definition of insanity. Don't go there. Bring your questions in for class Q & A. You will have fun once you figure it out. I am here to help.
- Your participation is key to the success and enjoyment of this course.
- You must come to class prepared – having done the required homework, study and practice. There is open lab time available. Stay and use it. Plan time to practice. The software we use is only available in this room (404). You will need to plan enough time in the room to complete your lessons and assignments.
- Attendance: Simply put, you are required to be here. Attendance is part of your grade.
- Assignments: We will begin assignments in class as demonstrations. You will have to complete assignments outside of class when necessary.
- Plan to sew your assignments into samples weekly. Plotting is planned for Thursdays so that you have a few days to have them sewn for Tuesdays.
- Quizzes: Please be prepared for random written canvas or practical quizzes.
- If there is something specific you would like to learn, related to our class, please ask.
