Course Description

Course Catalog Description

Integration of biological, behavioral & socio-cultural factors in human sexuality and relationships. Personal & social-sexual issues as they relate to decision-making concerning sexual behavior and sexual health are explored. There are no prerequisites for this course.

Overview

This course is an introduction to human sexuality and relationships. Some of the topics WE WILL discuss include: sexual research, anatomy, gender, sexual orientation, diversity, love, communication, sexual behavior, STDs/STIs and health, pregnancy and childbirth, contraception, abortion, sexual dysfunctions and treatment, atypical sexual behavior, sexual coercion, and the commercialization of sex. We still study diversity directly, and it will also be woven throughout the other topics in the course.

Regardless of your major, General Education courses build a foundation of broad knowledge and skills that help you in your further career and life:

It is designed not only to teach the information and skills required by the discipline, but also to develop vital workplace skills and to teach strategies and skills that can be used for life-long learning. Education is much more than the acquisition of facts; it is being able to use information in meaningful ways in order to enrich one's life.

While the subject of each course is important and useful, we become truly educated through making connections of such varied information with the different methods of organizing human experience that are practiced by different disciplines. This course, when combined with other General Education courses, will enable you to develop broader perspectives and deeper understandings of your community and the world, as well as challenge previously held assumptions about the world and its inhabitants.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Students will describe human sexuality accurately and clearly from multiple perspectives (emotional, physical, psychological, etc.) and identify the health implications of sexual decision making.
- Students will analyze verbal/nonverbal communication and conflict resolution in the context of sexual relationships. They will communicate their knowledge through class discussions and written assignments on contemporary and pertinent topics, increasing their ability to discuss sexual matters in an informed and candid way.
- Students will analyze basic data on theories and research, through class discussion and written assignments.
- Students will analyze their own thoughts, ideas, and values as they relate to human sexuality. They will discuss their opinions of sexual topics and research through class discussions and written essays.
- Students will explain and analyze current events that effect human sexuality, including personal and cultural variations in beliefs/values/attitudes/knowledge about human sexuality.

Your grade will be based on the following components:

47% of your grade: Quizzes

There will be seven equally weighted unit quizzes during the semester. The quizzes may include multiple-choice, true/false, and short answer questions. You will not be able to retake quizzes or make up missed quizzes.

LIFELINE: Canvas will automatically drop lowest quiz score, so if you miss a quiz or are unhappy with a low grade, don't worry: it doesn't have to affect your grade AT ALL.

The first two quizzes will be open-book quizzes, so you can get a feel for the software and the class. For the open-book quizzes, you may use your book, your notes, and any other resource except another person. The remaining quizzes will be closed-book quizzes, where you may not use any resource (other than your memory).

Quizzes will require the LockDown Browser software. Instructions for downloading/installing the software are posted on the Technology and Software page in the Getting Started section of Canvas. The software allows you to take quizzes off-campus and uses your device's webcam and microphone to proctor your quizzes, which can then be reviewed by your professor. Like Canvas, the LockDown Browser complies with federal privacy laws to protect your information. IMPORTANT: Please take note of the following:

- Equipment: If you do not have the necessary equipment to use the LockDown Browser, you must notify me within the first week of class to make other arrangements.
- Ebooks: If you are using an ebook for the class, you will need to use TWO devices for open-book quizzes: one device to take the quiz with the LockDown Browser and a separate device to access the ebook. For example, you could take the quiz on a laptop and access the ebook on your phone.

43% of your grade: Essays

Essays will be an important component of your learning experience. While quizzes typically capture knowledge/understanding of a given concept, writing assignments will push you to APPLY those concepts. See the ESSAYS document on Canvas for instructions, grading criteria, etc.

LIFELINE: As with the quizzes, Canvas will automatically drop your lowest essay score, so a missed essay or unusually low score will not hurt you.

5% of your grade: Attendance and Participation

In-class attendance will be taken on a regular basis, using a signup sheet, an in-class activity, or something similar. Anyone not in the classroom at the time attendance is taken will be considered absent. Attendance for a class period may be reduced for a student who is distracted, who is not participating, who is working on other things, etc.

5% of your grade: ePortfolio (NOTE: You cannot pass the class without the ePortfolio)

Your General Education ePortfolio tells your SLCC learning story. Your ePortfolio enables you to introduce yourself to your professors and classmates, showcase your learning, and reflect on how your courses connect to each other, your life, goals, and community. The ePortfolio, which is a common feature in all General Education courses at SLCC, helps you connect with other students and communicate with professors about how you learn, what you are taking away from your experience, and what supported your learning in their class. Professors can use your ePortfolio to get to know you before class and use your reflections and signature assignments to continuously improve their teaching.

Your General Education ePortfolio will also help you weave together the concepts you learn across all General Education courses. To do this, each General Education course you take at the college will ask you to demonstrate your engagement with the General Education learning outcomes by designing a course-specific ePortfolio page that includes a Signature Assignment and reflection. When you finish your time at SLCC, your ePortfolio should provide a multi-media showcase of your educational experience and tell the story of your learning growth while at SLCC. ___% of your grade: Extra Credit

There are three types of Extra Credit in this class. Together, they can significantly help you. The Extra Credit consists of:

- **Lifelines:** See above.
- **Bonus Point:** A 1% Bonus Point boost will be given to students who submit an anonymous Course Evaluation at the end of the semester. Instructions are posted on the Bonus Point assignment page.
- **Modified Curve:** Final grades will be based on a “modified curve.” The top grade in the class will be boosted up to 100%, and every student in the class will receive the same number of “curve” points. For example, if the top grade at the end of the semester is 98.3%, then every student will receive a 1.7% adjustment to their grade.

Due Dates and Deadlines

Deadlines will be at 11:59 p.m. on the due date. All assignments must be submitted through the assignment page on Canvas (not emailed). If you are outside of Mountain Time Zone for any reason during the semester, make sure to submit your work before the Mountain Time Zone deadline.

Late work: Late work will be accepted with a deduction of 10% per day (0.04% per hour), but please note that Canvas is a computer so it is very strict about the 11:59 p.m. deadline and will round up to the next whole hour block. In other words, if an assignment is due at 11:59 on Tuesday and you turn it in at 12:05 a.m. on Wednesday, Canvas will count that as one hour late. I will score the assignment just like any other student's work, and then Canvas will reduce the score by 0.04% per hour.

Please do NOT make the mistake of waiting until late in the day, when an unexpected technology glitch could prevent you from getting your work turned in on time. Prepare your assignments ahead of time so that if you encounter a problem, you will still have

time to go to a neighbor's house, to the library, or to an SLCC campus to submit your work.

Do not schedule events/travel/etc. during Finals Week. You will not be able to take the Final early.

Time Commitment

This is a 3-credit hour course. A “credit hour” is the amount of time (including classroom time, if applicable) that each class at the College is expected to take. Each credit hour should take 45 hours during the semester (<http://www.slcc.edu/policies/docs/c4s02-10.pdf>), so a 3-credit hour class like this should take you a total of 135 total hours this semester.

You can use this table to know how to break down any 3-credit hour class (for any semester) into a weekly time commitment:

Plagiarism

Plagiarism is a serious issue at all colleges/universities and is a violation of the SLCC Code of Student Rights and Responsibilities (“CSRR”). See pp. 15-16 of the CSRR. (Link below.) Plagiarism occurs when you include another person’s work (their words or even their ideas) within your own work without giving them proper credit. To avoid plagiarism, you must properly cite any source you use in your work (other than sources of common knowledge). A plagiarism-checking system has been integrated into Canvas and will check ALL assignments. Papers containing plagiarized material will receive a score of 0 for a first offense. A student who plagiarizes a second time may fail the course.

Extreme Circumstances: Incomplete Grade

In very rare circumstances, students may be awarded a grade of “Incomplete” (“I”) at the end of the semester, giving them additional time to complete the course. Students must

meet ALL THREE of the following criteria in order to receive an Incomplete:

- the student provides documentation of circumstances beyond their control (such as serious illness, death in the family, or change of employment) that prevent them from completing the course;
- the student is passing the course at the time of the request; and
- the student has completed a substantial portion (at least 3/4) of the course.
