Course Description

Introduces professional screenwriting techniques, with focus on properly formatting screenplays for film, including narrative style projects. The student will be required to develop a script using professional screenplay software.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Demonstrate competency in properly formatting a screenplay for film or broadcast, using the basic creation of scene headings, character, dialogue and action.
- Demonstrate competency in using story-telling techniques used in the professional film industry, such as the 3-act, 7-sequence story structure and the aristocratic storytelling method.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the many terms in the screenplay formatting language.
- Demonstrate professional screenplay formatting and storytelling skills by participating in roundtable discussions with fellow students, by reading each other's

screenplays and critiquing one another's work.

Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

There are several short essay assignments and exercises throughout the semester. The core assignment for the semester will be to write a 10-page (or less) screenplay in the 3-act story structure. Each student will write Act 1, Act 2, and Act 3 from about midterm to

the end of the semester. At the end of the semester, each student will do one revision on their final screenplay.
