# Film 1510: Documentary Film Production 1 Salt Lake Community College Spring/Fall

#### **Course Description:**

FLM1510: Documentary Film Production 1 is an entry-level film production course that provides introductory audio and video recording and post-production techniques for the documentary film production environment. This course also introduces students to a theoretical framework for examining documentary films as cultural artifacts and representations of reality. Recommended FLM1045 or COMM2200

#### **Course Learning Outcomes:**

1. Students employ basic documentary film production vocabulary and chronicle major historical movements and styles in the documentary film form (SLO 1, 4).

- 2. Students operate field production cameras to capture planned shots and sequences (SLO 1, 5).
- 3. Students employ audio recording devices to collect high-quality sound in field-production environments (SLO 1, 7).
- 4. Students utilize studio and location lighting equipment to craft intentional visual aesthetics (SLO 1, 5).
- 5. Students analyze story structure and apply creative editing techniques to shape compelling nonfiction narratives (SLO 2, 5).
- 6. Students appraise ethical issues and apply ethical filmmaking principles in their projects working with interview participants and members of the community (SLO 6, 7).
- 7. Students synthesize research, planning, shooting, and editing skills to produce complete short documentary films from beginning to end (SLO 1, 2).
- 8. Students evaluate and critique documentary films using criteria related to style, structure, aesthetics, and ethics (SLO 4, 8).

# **Course Content:**

The learning for this class is divided into the following areas:

- Successful mastering of video production equipment and camera technique is evaluated through repeated review and discussion of footage as compared to original conceptual idea.
- Successful mastering of audio recording equipment is evaluated through repeated review and discussion of footage as compared to original conceptual idea.
- Successful mastering of field lighting equipment is evaluated through repeated review and discussion of footage as compared to original conceptual idea.
- Evaluation of student productions will be based on their ability to use the equipment effectively. Student productions will be graded on their effective editing of video, audio, and graphics creation. Projects will be shown in class and critiqued by the teacher and students, using a rubric with input from professionals in the industry.
- Student productions will be graded on their effective combination of video, audio, and lighting. Projects will be shown in class and critiqued by the teacher and students, using a rubric with input from professionals in the industry.
- Quizzes and in-class exercises will be given to evaluate student competencies. Students create a production log and are graded on adherence to original concept versus final project. Students participate in a peer review.

#### **Course Assessments:**

**Observation Assignment:** Students select any location to observe at the micro and macro levels.

The Interview: Students conduct an interview with a subject expert in the field.

**B-Roll:** Students record and present footage to support talking head interview footage.

**Audio Documentary:** Students document a simple idea through carefully recorded and edited audio layers.

**Short Documentary:** Students produce and direct a five-minute short documentary film. Select projects are included with the end-of-semester public screening program.

**Pitch Deck:** Students pitch an idea for a documentary film to be produced in class following industry-standard idea pitch best practices.

**Genre Presentation:** Students present research to show understanding of documentary film genre conventions through a formal class presentation.

**Film Analysis Paper:** Students write a three-page analysis of one documentary feature film.

**Public Film Screening:** Students participate in the Film Program end-of-semester public screening event.

**In-Class Exercises:** Students contribute to hands-on film production environment and demonstrate understanding of learned concepts.

**Quizzes:** Students demonstrate an understanding of the facts by reading retention quizzes throughout the semester.

**Midterm:** The cumulative midterm exam measures student information retention and understanding through multiple choice, matching, multiple answer, true/false, and short essay questions.

**Final Exam:** The cumulative final exam measures student information retention and understanding through multiple choice, matching, multiple answer, true/false, and short essay questions.

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# Grading Scale:

## Attendance Policy:

Students are expected to attend all classes in which they are enrolled on a regular and punctual basis. Failure to do so indicates that the student is not serious about their education. If a student must miss class, they are responsible to acquire notes and assignments from canvas and peers. Networking with other students is highly recommended.

Students who are absent for more than approximately 20% of the class periods in a semester, and who do not have a valid, documented excuse, will receive an "E" grade for the course. This class meets twice a week, so if a student were to be absent six times, they would receive an E grade regardless of the work submitted.
