
Course Description

Coursework & Assignment Descriptions

Quizzes:

There will be a quiz after every class from the reading material and class discussion during the semester. The quiz for the week will open at the end of each class. The weekly quizzes are due the evening before the following class at 11:59pm on Canvas. The quizzes are time limited, usually 20 minutes per quiz. So, once you open the quiz you need to finish it before time runs out. You may use your book, notes and memory to complete the quiz but nothing else. You may not do quizzes together. You will be given 2 attempts per quiz. If you choose to use your second attempt, be aware that your grade will be the average of the two scores. Your two lowest quiz scores during the semester will be dropped. The final exam is based on the quizzes. The quizzes are meant to mirror the Utah knowledge exam.

Written assignments:

There will be written assignments throughout the semester. Please pay attention to Canvas for information regarding these assignments as well as all assignments. You will be asked to think about the various aspects of culture, including your own and deaf culture. You will be asked to reflect upon your expectations for this class, as well as provide feedback at the end.

Observation of a Certified Interpreter:

Involvement in the Deaf community is paramount to becoming a successful interpreter. In addition, observing skilled interpreters on the job will help you in your learning process. To that end, you are required to watch a video where you will observe the work of a team of local certified interpreter(s) for approximately 60-minutes, you will then listen to a 12minute radio interview. You will then write a paper that describes what you observed, while at the same time applying what you have learned in class and from reading to what you witnessed. You will demonstrate the ability to recognize demands of the setting and the controls the interpreters employed. You will identify, describe and reflect upon the many various aspects of interpreting. Please pay close attention to the rubric for the assignment.

Remember this is a prerequisite class for the ASL/English Interpreting Program where English skills and the ability to reflect are a must. Reflecting: thinking about what you learned, and describing your thoughts, feelings, and connections.
