Course Description

This course covers significant legal issues that arise in the context of business such as torts, product liability, contracts, intellectual property, banking, agency, commercial law, etc. Through critical thinking students create frameworks to recognize legal issues before they arise, prevent them if possible, and follow an attorney's advice effectively.

Get To Know Your Course

This course is a fully online course, which means that most of the content is delivered on the pages in the course. It is important to not skip any of the pages in the course by just going directly to the quizzes and assignments like you might do for a face-to-face class.

The course is designed for you to progress linearly. The pages, quizzes, discussions, and assignments build on each other in a particular order. You'll want to start with the orientation module and then move through every page in each module. You can do this by using the Next button at the bottom of the page or by using the "Modules" tab on the left-hand menu. These are the best ways to view the course (not via the other tabs on the left or the to-do list on your dashboard).

The following is an overview of each of the links in the course navigation menu:

- The "Home" page includes instructor information, important links, the course calendar, as well as links to all of the modules.
- The "Announcements" tab on the left-hand menu will give you access to all of the announcements the instructor has sent out that have not expired.
- The "Modules" tab will allow you to see all of the pages in the course, including the quizzes and assignments and when they are due. From this view of the course, you can navigate straight to any page in the course.
- "Grades" will track your points earned on assignments in the course.

Assignment Types

There are many types of assignments that you will complete in this course:

Vocabulary Checks

These are quick multiple choice quizzes meant to help you retain vocabulary and concepts that you just read. Every module has multiple readings, and every reading will have a vocabulary check. You may take vocabulary checks as many times as you want before the due date.

• Concept Checks

These are multiple choice quizzes that will take you much longer to complete than the vocabulary checks. They are meant to test your critical thinking and application skills, and relate directly to all of the content that you have read in the module. You have two chances to take the concept check and correct any previous errors.

Open Ended Discussions

These discussions are meant to introduce you to new concepts, new problems, and interesting questions that pertain to business law. They are meant to facilitate interaction, as well as to support the concepts that you have been reading about in the module. These discussions will be graded with a rubric.

Case Analyses

This activity is meant to test your ability to analyze a legal problem using the IRAC method of analysis. It will test your application of the reading, your ability to break apart legal problems, and your communication skills. These case analyses will be graded with a rubric.

End of Unit Exams

There are three units in this course. At the completion of each unit there will be a unit exam. These are comprehensive multiple choice tests and will cover every reading in every module throughout the unit. Since there are three end of unit exams there will be no final.

About This Course

This course covers some of the significant legal issues that arise in the context of business. Our aim is to help you, through critical thinking, create frameworks in your mind so you recognize legal issues before they arise, prevent them if possible, and follow your attorney's advice effectively when necessary. You will accomplish this and develop a legal vocabulary for discussing legal issues through readings, concept and vocabulary check questions, discussion questions, and case analysis assignments.

The course is divided into 15 modules grouped into 3 units. In each module you will read an overview of the module and selected readings from Business Law: An Introduction by Jason Gordon (hosted with permission from The Business Professor (Links to an external site.)Links to an external site.)Links to an external site.), which is the primary text for this course. This reading is broken up by quick vocabulary checks meant to help you retain the information from the text. Modules also include concept checks, case studies, and open ended discussions meant to help you critically think about business law in new and interesting ways. Additionally you will have an exam after every unit for which you must prepare. There are three unit exams, and no final.

No prior business law knowledge is required to complete this course. However, we recommend that you have completed Business 1010 or Business 1050 before completing this course.

- Learn and use business legal vocabulary in appropriate contexts
- Differentiate between various legal systems (public, private, civil, criminal, administrative, etc.)
- Discover potential liability risks common in business and determine when legal counsel is necessary
