Course Description

Practical application of the fundamental principles presented in MORT 2400 Embalming II.

Prereq: MORT 1400 and MORT 1405

Coreq: MORT 2400

Semester: Fall

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Identify and apply the general embalming treatments of the human body.
- Identify and analyze the problems caused by various forms of death, including but not limited to infections, communicable diseases, trauma, and pathological conditions.
- Demonstrate embalming procedures for delayed embalming, body transfer, and delayed viewing.
- Apply embalming analysis and post embalming procedures.
- Document with written embalming reports the body conditions, and embalming procedures performed.
- Apply embalming treatments of discolorations, decomposition, dehydration, vascular difficulties, moisture considerations, trauma, radiation, freezing, purge, distention, medical devices, deformities, and rigor mortis.
- Analyze the general chemical reactions of embalming fluids on the body.
- Demonstrate embalming procedures of the infant, autopsied body, obese body, and organ and tissue donor body.

- Apply treatment of non-embalmed bodies and identify the procedures for identification viewing.
- Apply information learned in Microbiology, Anatomy, Pathology, Chemistry, and Restorative Art to create a protocol to be used for the embalming process.
- Demonstrate the ethical, legal and professional responsibilities associated with the custody, Sheltering, identification, and embalming preparation of the dead human body.

Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

ASSIGNMENTS: There are only 4 assignments in this lab, however each assignment has multiple parts. <u>These assignments should be completed as soon as possible</u>. The due date is the second to last Thursday of the semester (aka the Thursday before finals.)

<u>Lab Participation (100 pts)</u>: You will receive a packet on the first day of MORT 2400 for your MORT 2405 lab. This packet has reports and supplemental forms for 10 embalmings, 2 cremation preparations, 2 visitations, 2 first call (removal) 5 funeral services, and 5 arrangements.

<u>Reflection/ Journal (100 pts)</u>: You are also expected to keep a journal of your experiences during the lab participation assignments. This journal can be typed or hand written (make sure it is neat)

<u>Professionalism (100 pts)</u>: Professionalism points will be based on you maintaining professional character during your clinical work. This includes showing up when scheduled, willingness to work when needed, adhering to funeral home policies, collaborating with your preceptor, and your overall conduct & attitude during clinicals

Additional Policies

PREPARATION, ATTENDANCE, AND PARTICIPATION: You are expected to be at your clinical sites when you are not in school. When at the clinical sites, you should be involved in the embalming room, going on first calls, helping on services and with viewings, helping to get bodies ready for their funeral, helping out around the office.

PROFESSIONALISM: Professional behavior includes attendance, <u>punctuality</u>, participation, respect for preceptors, clinical site employees and patrons. Professionalism also includes appearance. You should be in business professional clothing (suits- pants or skirt, dress shirts, blouses, skirts, slacks, dresses etc.) If you ever aren't sure if what you are wearing is professional, ask someone you trust at work or in class.

INCOMPLETE POLICY: An incomplete is a conditional grade given only in extraordinary cases where a student has completed a major portion of the class but is unable to complete course work due to circumstances beyond their control (e.g. major illness/injury, death in the family).
