Course Description

Introduction to facial restoration techniques, including restoration of facial expressions & proportions by proper use of instruments & special materials. Emphasis is placed on major restoration including problem cases which require illusionary corrections, waxes, cosmetics, hair restoration, color matching & masking of small and extensive discolorations.

Prereq: MORT 1400 and MORT 1405 Coreq: MORT 2605 Semester: Fall

- Identify the natural and acquired facial markings of the face and neck.
- Identify the forms of the head and face from the profile, frontal and bilateral views.
- Identify the four major facial features, their parts and variations.
- Differentiate between restoration and embalming procedures.
- Identify and describe the various cosmetics, restorative equipment, materials and treatments.
- Identify the natural and acquired facial markings of the face and neck.
- Discuss the importance of obtaining permission to perform any restorative procedure.
- Analyze photographs for restorative reconstruction.
- Explain facial proportions and how they relate to the natural form of the facial features and facial restoration.

- Identify and locate the major bony structures of the skull and explain how each influence surface forms.
- Identify and locate the major muscles of the face and explain how each influences surface form and expression.
- Classify and explain the principles of pigments, and their relation to cosmetic compounds.
- Classify and explain the principles of illumination.
- Describe the selection of correct colorants to achieve a natural appearance under varied conditions.



Additional Policies
