Practical application of the fundamentals learned in MORT 2600 lecture.

Prereq: MORT 1400 and MORT 1405 Coreq: MORT 2600 Semester: Fall

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Name and locate anatomical parts of an ear, nose, eye and mouth.
- Identify and locate natural and acquired facial markings.
- Construct an isolated ear, nose, eye, and mouth using modeling wax.
- Locate entry points for hypodermic injection of tissue builder.
- Explain the importance of obtaining permission to perform restorative procedures.
- Interpret a photograph by analyzing and differentiating the highlights, shadows, and facial proportions.
- Calculate and create correct facial proportions.
- Demonstrate hypodermic tissue restoration.
- Apply correct eye restoration techniques.
- Apply, from a specified cosmetic medium, the correct colorants to achieve a natural appearance under varied conditions.
- Demonstrate restorations involving wax.
- Identify and apply various types of restorative and cosmetic waxes.
- Apply hand-applied cosmetics and airbrush cosmetics.



Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

Each facial feature model will be completed in the lab. Students will attempt to create a properly sized feature consisting of all parts. Students will also verbally identify each part of the feature to the instructor. The final project will consist of the student modeling a complete face with proper dimensions and facial markings. Each modeling project will be evaluated based upon general form, likeness to photograph, and correct proportion of the face and features. Hair restoration and cosmetic application is optional.

Additional Policies
