Course Description

4th semester of a 4-semester series. Material to be covered: advanced chromatic harmony, impressionism and 20th century theory including set theory, serialism, etc.

Prereq: MUSC 2110 w/C grade or better. Coreq: MUSC 2140 for Music majors. Semester: Fall

Course Student Learning Outcomes

 Students will master the following concepts related to music theory: Advanced Chromaticism, Expanded Tonality, Impressionism, Diatonic Church Modes, Nondiatonic Scales, Extended Tertian Harmony, Polyharmony, Quartal and Secundal Harmony, Pandiatonicism, 20th Century Rhythmic and Metrical Techniques, Atonality, Serialism, Set Theory, and Aleatory or Chance Music.

- Students will demonstrate ability to perform analysis of musical works relative to the topics outlined in #1 above.
- Students will demonstrate ability to compose or arrange music using the techniques and concepts outlined in #1 above, providing an appropriate analysis of their composition.

Course Prerequisites


Prerequisite: Successful completion of MUSC 2110 with a C grade or better.

Required Supplies

10 or 12 stave music manuscript paper, pencil, and eraser. Access to music notation software (I recommend Finale, although there are other equally-good applications such as Sibelius). Favorite free options include Noteflight (http://www.noteflight.com) and MuseScore (https://musescore.org/). The use of such software will not be taught in this class, however. You will be required to use notation software to complete your assignments and exams. The college also has computers with Finale installed in the MIDI Mixing Rooms that are available to use.

Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

Participation

Students are expected to be in class on time with their practice assignments completed. We spend much of our class time reviewing the work done on practice assignments. If a student is prepared and present in class, they will receive 100% participation for the day, even if they have made lots of errors on the practice assignments. Making mistakes leads to learning.

Graded Assignments

At the end of each chapter or group of chapters, there is a graded assignment. The exercises on the graded assignment will be like those in the practice assignments. These will be graded based on correctness according to the principles taught in this and previous theory classes.

<u>Midterm Exam</u>

The Midterm will focus primarily on concepts from the first half of the semester. Questions on the exam will be similar to exercises done previously in practice and graded assignments. The Midterm Exam is a take-home exam, and students will have a week to complete it.

Final Project

Instead of a final exam, students will compose an original work for their final project of the semester and of the theory sequence of classes. The composition should incorporate at least one of the concepts learned in the second half of the semester. The class will meet during our scheduled final exam time to perform the completed works. Students should bring a copy of the final score for the instructor as well as any other printed parts and score that are needed for the performance. The work should be a complete composition, with beginning middle and end. It will be evaluated in the following ways using a rubric that is available on Canvas: Playability, Incorporation of Theoretical Concept(s), Attention to Detail (notation), Wholeness / Form, and Overall Musicality. (The quality of the performance will not affect the grade on this final project.)

POLICY ON ATTENDANCE AND ASSIGNMENTS:

- Students who miss class do poorly. We cover a lot of material in this class. If you get behind due to your failure to attend class or do your assignments, it is very difficult to catch up. Expect a reading and written assignment each class period.
- Don't be afraid to ask questions. I appreciate class participation.
- 20% of your grade is based on "participation". Each time you are unable to participate in class discussions because you are absent or your practice assignments are not done, you will lose a portion of this grade.
- This class requires a lot of work outside of class time. College standards suggest at least two hours of outside work per hour of class time.
- Late graded assignments will be dropped 10% per day that they are late. If you cannot attend class, turn your assignments in on Canvas before class begins to avoid this penalty.
- Study groups are encouraged and can be very helpful, but you must do your own work on your graded assignments, your midterm and final.
