This course is the last semester of a four-semester series. It involves the development of aural skills, including sight singing and dictation of rhythms, melodies, and harmonic progressions in tonal and atonal music.

What is this course about?

General Information

Course Description

Final semester of a four-semester series. Continued development of aural skills, building on those learned in SS-ET I, II, & III. Music majors must take this course together with Music Theory IV (MUSC 2110). Prerequisite: MUSC 2130.

Course Content

Areas of emphasis this semester include quintuple meters, decorative chromaticism, inflected scale degrees, scalar variants, modal borrowing, secondary dominants, modulations to both closely related and distantly related keys, Neapolitan sixth chords, augmented sixth chords and chromaticism implying altered chords.

Course Objectives

Students will:

- Demonstrate ability to sing rhythms and melodies at sight
- Use elements learned in MUSC 1130 and MUSC 1140
- Quintuple meter
 decorative chromaticism degrees
 modal borrowing
 augmented sixth chords
 decorative inflected scale degrees
 scalar variants
 modulations to closely related and distantly related keys
 chromaticism implying altered chords
 - Use of appropriate solfège syllables
 - Take melodic, rhythmic, and harmonic dictation

Note: If you miss an exam or are late for it, you will receive a "0," but you can use that exam as the low score exam. If you miss more than one exam, you will receive a "0" that counts toward your grade. No makeup exams will be given.

Homework

- You cannot develop these skills with just the in-class exercises.
- You must also spend time each day outside of class practicing your sight singing and dictation skills.
- Expect an assignment to practice your sight singing and dictation skills outside of class time every day.
- You ARE required to do all of the graded assignments.

Late Assignments Policy – If you are absent or are unable to turn in an assignment on the day that it is due, you may turn in the assignment late. It will be penalized 10% for each day that it is late. If you cannot attend class, email your assignments to me *before class begins* to avoid this penalty.

You may not turn in an assignment after the day of the exam for the unit to which that assignment belongs.

Sight Singing

EACH CLASS: Sight singing exercises from Music for SightSinging textbook

- Each module lists pages from the Sight Singing book for the week
- You will also be required to sing these by yourself or together with other students in class as part of the class activities

OUTSIDE OF CLASS

- You should not play the exercises on the piano or on any other instrument, including the SmartMusic application.
 - You may use a keyboard (or other instrument) to give yourself a starting pitch or to check your pitch at various points throughout the melody while you are learning them, but try to figure out the melodies by yourself, without hearing them (or even parts of them) first.
 - This is very important in your preparation for your sight singing exams where none of these crutches will be available to you.
- Use appropriate solfège syllables (hand signs not required)

- Use movable 'do'
- Use 'rhythmic' sight singing

Dictation

OUTSIDE OF CLASS: Spend time outside of class to learn the necessary music dictation skills

- Auralia is a computer application that allows you to practice these skills
- The ear training practice exercises and quizzes in rhythmic, melodic and harmonic dictation comes from Auralia.
 - o This application will give you the answers for most of the exercises.
 - When doing these exercises and quizzes at home, you may listen to them as many times as you need; however, you should strive to get to the point where you can successfully finish each exercise after hearing it only four times. Working with a partner to practice dictation skills can also be helpful and is highly encouraged.

Exams

10 EXAMS – Five Sight Singing Checkpoints and Five Dictation Quizzes

- Sight singing portion of each exam will be given separately
 - You will be given a melody to sing and will have a maximum of four minutes to prepare the melody before you must sing it for a grade.
- The lowest exam score in each area (dictation and sight singing) will be dropped (and will not count in your final grade total).

SLCC Syllabus Statement on Face Coverings

Hybrid Course Description

Because of social distancing, we are limited in the amount of seats we can have in the classroom. Therefore, you may be asked to occasionally rotate between face-to-face (F2F) and online (remote) instruction. To make this fair for everyone, a schedule will be set up and everyone will have the same amount of days in class and off campus.

Assigned Attendance — Alternatively, I may need to assign students to come on specific days and we will divide instruction between parts of the class. This is not optimal but it will allow everyone the same amount of F2F time on campus.

Safe Behavior — Please be aware of personal space and social distancing guidelines. I know we have heard this for nearly a year and many are tired of it. However, some are genuinely at risk and we want to make sure everyone is safe and has the same educational experience.

Classroom Layout — The classroom furniture is set up to adhere to recommended distancing guidelines (currently six feet apart). However, this will not stop us from collaborating. We will be using the "Collaborate" feature on Canvas (if possible), working at the whiteboard, consulting with peers, etc. Please do not let social and physical distance be a barrier to communication. We will still interact and will be very creative about it.
