

 political behavior, public policy, and/or historical development of modern political
 ideologies.
- Identify similarities and differences among the major political ideologies.
- Communicate knowledge as to the role that citizens, governmental institutions and private actors play as envisioned by each ideology.
- Engage in civil debate about the major political ideologies in class, on-line forums and society.
- Describe how the course connects to a General Education framework, which includes analysis of content and methodological overlap of US Government and Politics with other disciplines in the social sciences and humanities.
- Find, analyze and contextualize appropriate source material in the library or online (primary documents, case studies, journal articles, etc.,) and provide thorough attribution.

Weekly Reading Summaries (WRS): 98 points (7 per week)

• Most weeks you will be asked to summarize some key points from each week's material. You will turn in the WRS by each FRIDAY NIGHT. There is one exception, which is the shortened Week 16.

Critical Thinking Responses (CTR): 196 points (14 per week)

 Most weeks you will complete an analysis of the week's content through three critical thinking questions by SUNDAY NIGHT. There is one exception, which is the shortened Week 16.

Content Quizzes: 80 points (20 each)

• You will take four quizzes in specific weeks which will deal with five specific sections of course content. The quizzes will be in multiple choice and short answer format and will be completed by each respective SUNDAY NIGHT.

Matching Quizzes: 60 points

• You will take five matching quizzes. The first four will be worth 10 points each and you will have multiple attempts to take them. The final matching quiz will be worth 20 points and you will only have one attempt.

Short Article Analyses: 160 points (40 each)

• You will complete 4 short article analyses. They will be worth 40 points each.

Midterm Article Reviews: 150 Points

• You will complete one midterm in class based on article analyses

E-portfolio and Reflection Assignment: 41 Points

- Upload one of your corrected 'Article Analysis' assignments to your e-Portfolio
- Write a reflection on the process of completing the assignment, how the content connects to other subjects and what you learned from the assignment.
- In the Canvas assignment portal, you only need to submit the link to your e-Portfolio. Make sure your e-portfolio settings allow outsiders to view your material.

Final Narrated Presentation: 200 Points

Video Presentation of PowerPoint (or similar) Bio of Famous Person- 200 points. 10-12 minutes. I will determine each person's grade in the following way.
 60%=Content, 25%= Organization, 15%= Oral Delivery

*For this assignment, I want you to choose ONE political leader from the list below.

If you want to choose someone not on the list, then ask me and I will likely have no problem with your selection. You will create a PowerPoint (or similar) related to how a famous person is connected to one or more of the ideologies we studied in this course. This assignment hopes to bring some of our ideologies to life.

o Your presentation will include the following components. Provide a brief bio of the person selected. Then, describe their general worldview and the ideology/ideologies with which they most align. What methods did they use to realize their political objectives? How successful where they in their political goals?*

General Education Information

General Education Statement

This course fulfills the **SS** requirement for the General Education Program at Salt Lake Community College. It is designed not only to teach the information and skills required by the discipline but also to develop vital workplace skills and to teach strategies and skills that can be used for life-long learning.

General Education courses teach basic skills as well as broaden a student's knowledge of a wide range of subjects. Education is much more than the acquisition of facts; it is being able to use information in meaningful ways to enrich one's life.

ePortfolios

Each student in general education courses at SLCC is to create and maintain a General Education ePortfolio. Instructors in every general education course will ask you to put at least one assignment from the course (known as the "Signature Assignment") into your ePortfolio and accompany it with reflective writing.

The Many Uses of ePortfolios

Your General Education ePortfolio tells your SLCC learning story.
