Course Description:

The scientific study of society. Foundational sociological theories and methods create understanding of the diverse human experience, including race, class, gender, and social structure. Students will activate their "sociological imagination" to critically evaluate the social world they engage.

Credit Hours: 3

About the Course:

This course is designed to expose students to introductory sociological concepts. We will explore several of the foundational theories used to explore society. We will focus on many aspects of inequality and learn how to apply our 'sociological imagination' to the world around us. By engaging in service-learning we will have the opportunity to apply what we are learning in the classroom to our greater community.

Required Materials:

- Introduction to Sociology, (2nd ed) by OpenStax (used in most sections)
- Essentials of Sociology by James M. Henslin (used in select sections)
- Real World: An Introduction to Sociology by Ferris & Stein (optional for some sections)

Note: Students should confirm with the instructor if a specific text is required. Online versions or links will be available through Canvas.

Course Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate the substantive knowledge appropriate for a survey course in sociology, which also serves as the foundation for further courses in sociology.
- 2. Write and speak effectively using sociological concepts and perspectives and referring to relevant sociological theory and research.
- 3. Interpret sociological data as represented in tables, graphs, and charts.
- 4. Compare and contrast the three major perspectives in sociology including Conflict Theory, Symbolic Interactionism, and Functionalism as they are applied to various topics in the course. They will also be able to compare and contrast competing theories that are used to explain the same social phenomenon.
- 5. Apply their sociological imagination in order to better understand their own social experience and also the experience of others.
- 6. Use and understand basic social scientific language.
- 7. Explore their personal experience through broader theoretical frameworks.
- 8. Describe the social structures of bureaucracies, institutions, and organizations that they come in to contact with.
- 9. Demonstrate their understanding of sociological concepts by applying them to their personal experiences via class assignments.
- 10. Use the scientific method to study society.

Course Requirements

A. Discussions and Participation

• Students are expected to participate actively in weekly discussions on Canvas or in class. Contributions will be graded based on thoughtfulness and relevance.

B. Weekly Quizzes

 Quizzes on readings and lectures will be administered regularly to assess understanding of core concepts and theories.

C. Exams

 Three to four exams covering key sociological theories, data analysis, and critical thinking exercises. Exams may include multiple-choice, true/false, and essay questions.

D. Signature Assignments

- 1. **Sociological Imagination Paper**: Reflect on a group or community you belong to, analyzing it through a sociological lens.
- 2. **Breaking the Norm Project**: Observe and document responses to non-normative behavior, applying theories on societal norms and deviance.

E. Service-Learning (if applicable)

For sections with a Service-Learning designation, students will complete a minimum of 15
hours with a community partner and submit a reflection paper. Participation fulfills part of the
requirements for the Civically Engaged Scholar distinction.
