#### **Course Content and Organization:**

This course is an introduction to basic forms of data collection techniques utilized by sociologists. By *data*, we mean all sorts of empirical observations that we use to support or oppose an argument. The course will expose you to some basic research concepts including sampling, causation, as well as independent and dependent variables. The main goal of the course is to introduce you to basic tools of data analysis and presentation, as well as helping you to understand the underlying logic.

It is important to begin with the understanding that data analysis is not just for socalled "experts." The tools and concepts taught in this class are not just for those "producing" the data, but also for the "consumers" of data. We all are consumers of data at some level. We are constantly made aware of data within our worlds, from the trivial to the essential: "4 out of 5 dentists recommend" and "less than two out of five Americans support…" It is important to be able to process and think critically about the information we encounter every day – be it as students in a sociology class, consumers at the shopping mall, or as citizens in a democracy. This class is designed to help you become better "consumers" of data. It is also designed to create a solid foundation for the subsequent courses taught in the social sciences. It should also provide a useful base for those of you who will eventually go on to become producers of data in the form of your own research.

**Prerequisite:** None (Introduction to Sociology would be helpful but is not required as a prerequisite.)

## **Communicate Effectively**

Part of this communication skill will come from the ability to interpret and critically evaluate quantitative research results including tables, graphs, charts, and other specific research output including correlation matrices, scatterplots, and regression lines. By providing written analysis of analytical output, students will learn not only sociological vocabulary, but also gain a sense of effective scientific communication skills.

## **Develop Quantitative Literacies**

Students in this course will develop the ability to interpret and understand basic sociological research. They will be able to apply foundational methods and theories that drive empirical research in sociology.

### Think Critically and Creatively

Students will be challenged to understand how data can be manipulated, and how information can be used inaccurately to support any given agenda. It will be necessary to think critically about how and why data are presented in the manner that they are to interpret the validity of such presentation.

## **Course Requirements:**

The course is set up in Canvas using modules. Everything that you need to work on each week will be posted in that week's module. Most weeks you will have a discussion, an open notes/open book quiz and a short assignment to complete.

## **Research Project**
