Course Description

Examination of the major concepts, theories, and research studies pertaining to the sociological study of racial and ethnic groups. An exploration of the social construction of race and the social, economic, and political consequences of that construction. Course includes discussions on racism, stereotypes, prejudice, and discrimination, and strategies for increasing intergroup awareness and acceptance.

Semester: All

This course is designed to introduce you to the major concepts, theories, and research studies pertaining to the sociological study of racial and ethnic groups. Throughout the semester, we will explore the social construction of race in the United States and the social, economic, and political consequences of that

construction. We will also be discussing the nature and causes of racism, stereotypes, prejudice, and discrimination, and strategies for increasing intergroup awareness and acceptance. We will be challenging popular conceptions of race and ethnicity, and critically engaging sociological conceptions. As we begin this course, I would like to remind you that the sociological study of racial and ethnic groups is an evolving area of study, and many of the issues we will be discussing in class are far from settled.



Coursework & Assignment Descriptions

Course Requirements:

Each module involves reading one chapter, taking one open-book quiz, and half of the modules include an assignment. Please read the assigned chapters to be prepared to contribute to class discussions. Thank you!

Quizzes:

Each module or chapter will come with a quiz. All the quizzes are OPEN-BOOK. You can look up and double check answers. Use the quizzes as a study guide for the tests. Each quiz is worth 10 points.

Extra Credit

There are also Extra Credit matching quizzes. Use these quizzes to help you learn vocabulary. They are optional, and you will receive extra credit (2.5-4 points each) if you complete them. There is one Extra Credit Assignment available, and I will likely add another extra credit opportunity by the end of the semester.

Assignments:

There are five writing assignments for this course. For most of the assignments, you will read an article or two and answer a few questions. Each assignment is worth 25 points.

Exams

There is one midterm and one final for this course.

Signature Assignment

For the Signature Assignment, you will be creating a literature review of 5-6 sources, 3 of which must be peer-reviewed. There will be a preparatory assignment (25 points), the signature assignment (50 points), and an eportfolio assignment (10 points). Late Policy

Please turn in assignments on time. However, I accept late work and am flexible. I only take off a couple of points if an assignment is a few days late. Assignments that are weeks late will have more points taken off. However, I accept late work up until the last day of class and will at least give 50% of the points. If an emergency comes up, please let me know, and I will work with you to get assignments completed. All assignments must be completed by the last day of class.

This course fulfills the **DV**; **SS** requirement for the General Education Program at Salt Lake Community College. The Many Uses of ePortfolios

Your General Education ePortfolio tells your SLCC learning story. Your ePortfolio enables you to introduce yourself to your professors and classmates, showcase your learning, and reflect on how your courses connect to each other, your life, goals, and community. Professors can use your ePortfolio to get to know you before class and use your reflections and signature assignments to continuously improve their teaching.

to demonstrate your engagement with the general education learning outcomes by designing a course-specific ePortfolio page that includes a course-specific "Signature Assignment" and reflection.
