# Division of Performing Arts FALL 2024 SYLLABUS

The Instructor will provide scanned copies of important texts needed for class.

Theatre/Film 1513 is an introduction to basic stagecraft. Topics covered will be the physical theatre itself and its working parts, scenic construction techniques including tools, equipment, materials, and theatre safety.

Theatre Students registered for Stagecraft (Theatre 1513) must also register for Theatre 1160, the lab portion of the Stagecraft program, Film students registered for Stagecraft (Film 1513) must also register for the Theatre 1190 Production class, rather than 1160. Both of those sections meet at the same time: 3:00 to 4:50 in the Black box Theatre. Film students will complete 35 hours of Lab time rather than the full semester. We will all be one big happy family.

Students are responsible for the construction, running and strike of the Fall Black Box production. (Tech week begins October 28, Performances begin November 7), and possibly acting showcases and/or the Fall Dance Concert. Be sure to check the Canvas website regularly for announcements and assignments.

#### Goals:

- To gain an understanding of how the physical theatre operates, including the various types of theatres and their working parts.
- To develop familiarity with the tools and equipment required to execute theatrical designs.
- To demonstrate an ability to read and understand design documents such as scaled ground plans and elevations.
- To demonstrate an understanding of the various types of scenic elements and their uses.
- To become familiar with the materials and construction techniques used to create the scenic elements of a production.
- To develop critical thinking and problem-solving skills.
- To gain an ability to work collaboratively as part of a team in the development and execution of theatrical productions.

#### DEPARTMENTAL ATTENDANCE POLICY

In the Salt Lake Community College Theatre Department, attendance is an extremely important part of the educational experience. Students are expected to attend every meeting of their classes. In case of a necessary absence, students should contact their professor and any group members in advance and stay caught up on any missed work. Students are accountable for all academic activities, and faculty may require additional assignments to make up for the missed class or classes. In addition, faculty members are encouraged to make reasonable accommodations for students requesting to miss class due to health issues, emergencies, and the observance of religious holidays.

When a student reaches 3 absences in a course, or 3 tardies in a course, or a combination of the two, the student will be called to have a meeting with the department head to discuss their attendance. If the attendance problems persist, the student may be put on departmental probation for one semester. This probation will prohibit the student from auditioning or participating in departmental productions.

**Safety Requirement**: The work of technical theatre is dangerous. There is risk of bodily injury and death. Safety must be first, last, and always on our mind. Therefore, on days when you are doing course work in the scene shop, you are required to abide by the following:

- 1) Clothing must not be loose or flowing. Long pants and sleeves are recommended.
- 2) Shoes must be closed-toed.
- 3) Long hair on head and/or face must be pulled back and tied off.
- 4) Avoid jewelry, especially loose or hanging jewelry.
- 5) Always wear safety equipment properly.

You will not be allowed to work in the scene shop or backstage until you meet these requirements.

#### **GRADED POINTS DESCRIPTIONS**

#### Daily Points – 2.5 points each class x 40 classes = 100 POINTS TOTAL

Attendance is the most important part of any class and is even more important to the success of a live production. You are necessary! For each class you attend you may receive up to 2.5 points. Points will be taken away for tardiness, absence, failing to abide by safety requirements, inappropriate behavior, or inappropriate use of electronic devices. The loss of daily points is entirely at the discretion of the instructor. Note: there are 43 scheduled classes total in the semester. This gives the student one class that you may miss for any reason. All absences must be communicated to the instructor prior to or within 36 hours of the missed class, or the student will lose an additional day of Daily Points (5 points total).

#### Quizzes – 10 points each quiz X 10 quizzes = 100 POINTS TOTAL

Students will be quizzed periodically on lectures and other provided course material. All quizzes will be administered online via the course Canvas page. Quizzes must be completed on time to receive full credit. If a student misses a quiz, please contact your instructor to make proper arrangements for a make-up quiz. Some quizzes may be retaken for a better grade. Please discuss your options with the instructor by scheduling an appointment for office hours.

#### Exams – 50 points each X 2 exams = 100 POINTS TOTAL

Students will complete a "mid-term" and "final" exam. Exams are comprehensive and cover material from previous quizzes as well as other information from course lectures and provided materials. All exams will be administered online via the course Canvas page. Exams must be completed on time to receive full credit. Exams may not be retaken.
