Course Description

Introduction to principles of visual awareness and drawing. Use of line to describe 3D reality on a 2D surface. Linear perspective will be a primary emphasis. Course will include a study of value and light logic.

Semester(s): All

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Students will demonstrate substantive skill in accurate drawing of 3-D, physical objects, hand-eye coordination, making use of sighting techniques; proportion, line direction, vertical/horizontal alignments, and negative/positive shape analysis.
- Students will demonstrate substantive knowledge of key concepts and technical terms of linear perspective. Students will demonstrate substantive skill in the creation a two-dimensional illusion of three-dimensional subjects and three-dimensional space. Information, observed or imagined, is translated into a language or system that convincingly represents seen objects and spatial environments.
- Students will demonstrate substantive skill in the application of basic forms (cylinder, cube, sphere, cone) to a variety of objects as a method of drawing and analysis.
- Students will demonstrate substantive skill in the implementation of key concepts of light logic. Students will demonstrate substantive skill in the application of value as a means to create a two-dimensional illusion of a three-dimensional subject.
- Students will demonstrate substantive skills in composition, design, and the expressive use of line and value.

Engagement Plan

- I will respond to Canvas Messages within 24 hours. I will offer feedback on major assignments each week. The best way to contact me is via the Canvas Inbox, as I will prioritize this over other modes of communication.
- Additionally, I will share my perspective within the discipline and offer some

 putting the textbook below because it is both expensive and optional, but it is
 Perspective Drawing and Applications by Charles O'Connor. It's a good book, but a
 bit overpriced IMHO.

Keys for Success (how to succeed in the course)

Grading Criteria:

- 1. Performance on assigned projects.
- 2. Instructor's perception of the student's effort and commitment to the course, which should also be reflected in the student's performance. Thank you in advance for turning your phones off.
- 3. Attendance I will give you two unexcused absences without asking you any questions, but after that things get more complicated, and we need to have a conversation. Normally, anything above two unexcused absences would start affecting your grade adversely, quickly and severely, but we are still not really living in normal times. Essentially, if you have Covid related symptoms, I don't want you to come to class. Just contact me through Canvas if you must miss class for this reason and we'll have that conversation at the time. I'm not going to come down on anyone who catches Covid in here, and I want us all to be safe and unexposed if possible. Nevertheless, my advice is not to shoot for two absences. You'll miss a lot of important information, and I tend to smile upon perfect attendance when I've got my grade book out on that last day. Also, I usually take roll only once every day so if you come in late you need to make sure I get you on the roll. By Departmental Policy I cannot pass anybody who misses 20% of the class. This class meets only twice a week, and there are 30 total times we come together, so that means at

6 unexcused absences you have failed the class even if your work is amazing. Six absences is 3 weeks of class, which is a pretty absurd amount to miss without exceptional circumstances.

NOTE: Department Policy states that 3 Lates = 1 Absence, and they want me to keep track of this and do all that annoying math, which I truly dislike. However, I also dislike it when students can't get it together to be here on time, so realize that at my discretion I will be following this directive. This class meets early, and it only goes for two hours and 20 minutes, which is about a half hour too short in my opinion. So, essentially, you need to be here and ready to go at 7:30. Set an alarm. Don't be flaky.

An excused absence is one for which you have a medical or otherwise compelling reason for missing class, for which you would normally be required to provide some kind of documentation such as a doctor's note, death certificate, a picture of your positive Covid test, your appendix in a jar, etc. Key word here is compelling, folks, something which is serious and beyond your control. Job conflicts, domestic problems and other class or schedule conflicts are not considered valid by Departmental Policy. Also, if you're late or you miss class, please don't ask me to repeat everything you missed. Making friends with each other so you can get the information you missed from a classmate can be helpful in this way.

- 4. Turn in your projects on time. Anything you turn in, whether you consider it finished or not, will be considered your complete work. Late assignments will be marked down. No assignment turned in late will receive a clean "A" grade. Turn it in! On time!
- 5. On time assignments can be redone or "fixed" (once) for a better grade. Late assignments cannot be redone or fixed.

Important: Don't throw anything away until after the semester is over, no matter how shameful, because because I can't grade what I can't see.

Additional Materials

• 18" ruler, preferably the precision metal kind available at the bookstore.

- Drawing board to accommodate at least 18" x 24" paper. Can be a pre-made board such as those in the bookstore (not recommended) or simply a piece of MDF with 3-4 bulldog clips.
- 24" metal T-Square, not the cheesy plastic kind.
- Plastic triangle. Spring for a good one if you can at all afford it.
- Thin hand brush for cleaning off your workspace and drawing. It looks like this.
- Pad of good Drawing (not Sketch) paper 18" \times 24". Be forewarned: unless I specifically tell you otherwise, 18" \times 24" is the minimum size format for this class. Also: Absolutely no newsprint!
- 2B drawing pencil. I recommend these mechanical ones, sometimes called 2mm lead holders, or drafting pencil. You need a special sharpener for these, and the 2B leads are sold separately. I'll show you how to use the sharpener, as there's a trick to it.
- Pink pearl eraser, and a small retractable eraser like this: the FACTIS BM2 Mechanical Eraser and a couple of packages of refills. Buy one of these; you won't be sorry. Don't and you will.
- Masking tape for putting your work up during critiques.
- Box for supplies.
 - Some way of supporting your drawing while you are working on it at home. In class we'll have a piece of furniture/instrument of torture known as a donkey, or you might even work at an easel. But at home you're going to need to be inventive and come up with a solution that is both artistically and ergonomically workable.

Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

Several in- and out-of-class projects to be turned in on a weekly basis. You may expect a minimum of 3 hours of homework each week.

There will be no exams or quizzes, but we will meet in some capacity for our regularly scheduled Final Exam time at 7 am on Dec. 17. More details to come.

Grading Scale

A= Excellent. One of the most competent & compelling portfolios. I will give you an A only for superior work.

B= Good. Solid work which shows commitment to improving technique and firm understanding of concepts. Good means good, and should not be seen as an insult to your family's good name.

C= Fair. Some problems with attendance, effort, quality of portfolio. Usually reserved for work that could have been done by most anybody, or is only going through the motions. Hint: if you're bored, your work will be boring. This is the lowest grade you need for going on to other classes for which this one is a prerequisite. Other institutions might require a higher grade than this to accept the credit.

D= Poor. Not adequate work.

E= Fail. No class credit. This happens not so rarely, believe it or not. Can't think of a single time that it didn't accompany rotten attendance.
