Course Description

This course includes the discussion and operation of film and digital SLR cameras, along with film and digital lab techniques. Fully adjustable digital or film SLR camera and other photo equipment required. It is recommended that students take ART 1320 in the same semester as this course.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- SLR cameras in manual mode: learn, understand and apply procedures for taking
 pictures including metering, focusing, exposing, and evaluating. Learn, understand
 and apply shutter speeds and aperture f-stops manually and creatively. Learn and
 understand camera format and lens format. Emphasis will be using all elements of
 the camera in manual mode.
- Exposure meters: learn how to use reflected light meters in manual mode.
- Film Capture: learn and perform proper exposure techniques with film, learn about types of film, ISOs, and how to load, clean, store and handle film.
- Analog Workflow: learn and use tanks, reels, and the chemical process to develop film. Learn and use photographic papers, darkroom equipment, exposure and contrast controls, and the chemical process to print photographs.

- Digital Capture: demonstrate basic digital capture using both scanned film and digital cameras.
- Digital Workflow: learn and perform basic digital photographic workflow using Adobe Photoshop Lightroom. Learn and use ink jet papers, ink jet printers, exposure and contrast controls, and basic color management to print photographs.
- Basic Lighting: learn about and apply creatively qualities of available light.
- Composition: learn and apply the visual elements and principles of composition and how they relate to visual communication.
- History of Photography and Contemporary Photography: describe styles and trends and learn about the people involved.
- Presentation and Preservation of Photographs: learn and demonstrate archiving, dry mounting, and create a final project portfolio.

Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

This is a lecture/lab course. During the lecture portion of the course, students will explore a variety of image-making to produce original works of art. This will include lectures, demonstrations, hands-on exercises, and critiques. During the lab portion, students will practice more hands-on photographic techniques. This will include camera management, metering, and exposing. This will also include working in the Photo Lab learning both digital and analog workflow. Students will learn developing and printing techniques and apply basic knowledge and control of photographic materials.

Graduates demonstrate excellence in imagemaking techniques across analog and digital media platforms, integrating light as the essence of photography. Individual style is cultivated through curriculum grounded in inquiry, practice, and process, thereby becoming aware of one's own creative potential. Graduates exhibit awareness and competency in self-promotion, marketing, and the business of photography with ability to problem solve creatively in a wide variety of situations.

Industry demand for imagery is extremely high and supports photographers and videographers who can drive the marketplace forward. Photography is the visual engine for storytelling and is widely utilized across diverse businesses. Photographers provide analog and digitally produced imagery appropriate for use in advertising, architecture, aerial (drone), automotive, catalog, concerts, events, editorial, fashion, fine art, portraits, people, stock, sports, real-estate, and travel. Photographers often work entrepreneurial as freelance, or in-house for a business corporation, or digital technician, or digital image specialist, or image editor, or salesperson, and are attainable upon completion of an AAS degree. SLCC's longtime relationship with the media industry supports a strong and diverse network of accomplished alumni.

Expect to spend around \$100 on supplies. But don't be shocked – you need to buy what you need as we go.

The amount and type of film or digital media will depend on the student's individual needs for personal direction. The list above suggests the minimum amount of supplies needed for the course.

Instructor's Policy

- Only students registered for the class will be allowed in the classroom and lab. All others will be asked to leave No Exceptions!
- Students must keep a separate 3-ring binder/notebook for this course and bring it to class. This is your Technical Notebook, and it will be turned in for points at the end of the semester.
- Students must come prepared to work during class. This means bringing a camera, printing supplies, notepaper, and a pen or pencil to class every day. If not prepared, the student will be considered absent.
- Students must perform their own original work throughout the course. Work done for other and/or previous classes will not be considered for a grade. Work produced for previous assignments will also not be considered for a grade.
- Assignments are expected on the due date. If an assignment is late, 10% will be deducted from the grade. If the assignment is on time, but the student misses the critique or is late for the critique, 5% will be deducted.

- Students will be allowed the opportunity to rework and turn in any assignment for a better grade. (This excludes late assignments)
- Attendance is expected. Lectures and demonstrations will not be given twice. It is the student's responsibility to obtain any missed information from another student.
- The Visual Art and Design attendance policy will be followed in this course. See the attendance policy below.
- Late arrival to class and sleeping during class are considered an absence.
 - The class will start at the start time. Late arrival is the first 15 minutes.
- Attendance will be taken at the beginning and the end of each class session, including lab days.
- Students are expected to follow all studio and lab policies. Failure to do so may result in being dropped from the course without a refund and with a failing grade.
- All SLCC student codes/instructor codes must be followed throughout the course.

Visual Art & Design Attendance Policy

Students are expected to attend all classes in which they are enrolled on a regular and punctual basis. Failure to do so indicates that the student is not serious about his or her education.

If, on occasion, a student must miss class, they are responsible for acquiring notes and assignments from another student. Networking with other students is highly recommended.

If a student has a serious illness or has another valid and compelling reason for being absent more than 20% of the class periods, he or she should talk to the instructor about receiving an "incomplete" grade. The student should then be prepared to show documentation of the validity of the absences. Work for the class must then be completed within the next year, or else the grade will become an "E".

It must be emphasized that domestic problems, job conflicts, other class or schedule conflicts, etc., are not considered valid and compelling reasons for non-attendance. Instructors are not allowed to give an "incomplete" for these excuses.

Students who are absent for more than 20% of the class periods in a semester and who do not have a valid, documented excuse will receive an "E" grade for the course. To avoid this, the student must officially withdraw from the class.

If a student is tardy, it is his or her responsibility to notify the teacher of attendance (after the class is over).
