Course Description

Photographic expression and visual composition are explored through image capture and printing assignments. Emphasis placed on creative exploration, personal expression, and visual arrangement of content.

Prerequisite: ART 1310 or ART 1050 w/C grade or better (either may be taken concurrently)

Semester: Summer

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Analyze and assess photographs by skillfully implementing critique techniques.
- Implement the elements and principles of traditional visual composition into their photographic images.
- Illustrate perspectives, contexts, and narratives as they pertain to the discipline of photography.
- Apply apertures and shutter speeds as controllers of photographic composition/vision.
- Apply techniques to overcome creative block and examine visual creativity.
- Explain their personal visual goals and performance-based practices.
- Identify creative contributions made by photographers and artists.
- Develop a personal style and philosophy to produce original photographs that creatively tell stories.

Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

Photographic expression and visual composition are explored through image capture. Emphasis placed on creative exploration, personal style, and visual storytelling.

Students will explore the art principles of composition and design, the creative process, brainstorming for ideas, problem-solving and creating solutions. Practical and creative applications of these elements will be emphasized and performed during assignments and exercises. Students will perform these exercises through making photographs, research, reflection and class discussions. Personal expression and techniques are explored through various text reading and projects. Students will gain a better understanding and appreciation of the art of photography and will learn to explore their creative potential.
