Course Description

A continuation of Photograhy 1, with emphasis on producing high quality images through advanced camera controls and the applied aesthetics of photography. Cultivate vital color and grayscale theory, conceptual ideas, creative expression, and refinement of the photographic craft. A digital or film SLR camera is required.

- Demonstrate visual aesthetics through effective printing techniques across analog and digital applications.
- Evaluate essential quality of light and subject brightness through various lighting situations to achieve visual hierarchy, ideal camera exposure, image processing technique, and quality print control.
- Deconstruct contemporary trends and historical aspects as critical thinking for creative problem solving, creative inspiration, and apply as innovative expression

- producing visual imagery.
- Demonstrate refined application of color theory aspects for RGB/CMY color models, color contrast, color temperature, digital color space, ICC profiles, and digital color image processing for digital output or print.
