Digital Painting

Course Description

Expanding on traditional painting techniques using digital painting programs that mimic the use of traditional media. Projects focus on design and application for illustrations, special effects, 3D textures, and concept designs.

Prereq: ART/COMM/EBT/ENGL/FLM 1800 or ART 1280; ART 2110.

Semester: Fall & Spring

- Create and show differences and requirements of the VARIED FIELDS that use Digital Painting.
- Implement skill and techniques in using industry standard DIGITAL PAINTING SOFTWARE relating to creating images.

- Demonstrate PAINTING PRINCIPLES, techniques, and workflow relating to Digital Painting.
- Demonstrate PRODUCTION workflow as it relates to creating Digital Painting.

Engagement Plan

Example language:

Keys for Success (how to succeed in the course)

Many skilled artists fail in the professional world while less skilled artists succeed, due to Professionalism - the art of conducting oneself as a Professional. The soft skills of Professionalism are as necessary as artistic skill. After skill and style, it is why Clients/Employers will want to continue to work with you in a very competitive and saturated industry.

Professionalism is all about what you bring to the table, not how well or poorly that table is set. You do not need to wait until you have a degree to cultivate professionalism. You can start now. This class will provide an environment where you can learn to conduct oneself professionally, with consequences that parallel the art industry, but are not as harsh. Failure to conduct oneself with a high degree of professionalism will ensure failure in a commercial environment. Success in conducting oneself well, despite challenges or difficulties, will enable the highest chance of success and good reputation.

Assignment deadlines are not negotiable, no exceptions. Even if you cannot make it to class, your assignment can. Submit it online, email, or use a classmate - it will still be on time.

Assignments must be represented by someone in critique for full grade. Assignments without representation will receive a lower grade.

Final course grades are matters of averages. Incomplete and unrepresented assignments with lowered grades are always better than "0" grade.

Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

Specific objectives for each project will be outlined and explained in-class, given as a "Client Brief." Each assignment will accompany instruction on core principle of Art & Design. Each assignment can be partially completed during lab time, and will require time outside of class.
