Foundations of Business

BUS - 1050 005

Course Description

: Foundations of Business covers the nature, role, and purpose of business throughout history, including its philosophical, sociological, and economic dimensions. Topics include the foundations of trade, production, labor and capital, management, marketing, and finance.

Pre-Requisite(s): ENGL 1010 (may be taken concurrently)

- Explain the foundational ideas of business functions such as management, marketing, and finance.
- Debate the role of business within society and the community.
- Describe how the course material brought about changes in thoughts, beliefs, or attitudes about business.

Course Content Advisory

This class has many points/history that have been politicized. Students are never required to accept something they do not wish to, but they should be able to become aware of and explain what a scholar said, or explain something that science accepts. In a homework question asking for a student's opinion, full credit is possible even if the student does not accept something being discussed. It is important to be able to express yourself clearly. Test questions will be about facts from the readings. Tests will not require the student to pretend to accept or reject something against their conscience.

The content for this course has not been edited to remove language, concepts, or points of view that people may find offensive. The purpose is not to offend, but to provide context of the time and/or situations for when the material was originally written.

Additional Materials

This class doesn't require a textbook. It's what's called an Open Educational Resource (OER) class which means we use articles from credentialed authors and chapters from scholarly books. Readings are found in each module in Canvas.

Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

Every week this class has assignments (5 questions students need to answer and write an application statement). There's also a quiz that students must complete. The class has a final exam and a presentation that's due toward the end of the semester. Students are given "Attendance" points because this course is a "Lecture" course.

You can use AI or software to do the following:

- Format citations into APA for you. I like using https://www.citationmachine.net/apa, or References in Word.
- Re-word or fix grammar. You may paste your original writing into AI and ask it fix for grammar, clarity, or conciseness. If your paper is flagged for use of AI, you may be asked to submit your original written work as evidence you did the initial writing, so keep an unedited AI version of your.
- You may use AI to format your work in APA. APA can be a lot to learn initially. It requires a cover page, page numbers at the top right hand, headers throughout the document, specific citations, and a reference page.
- Any other use of AI is prohibited on this paper. This paper is considered an assessment of your skills and ability to research and analyze a career.
