## Woodworking & Millwork II

CMGT - 2220 401

### Course Description

Students continue with their skills in the construction of a skill building proejct that will include more advanced joinery than included in CMGT 1220. Students are taught how to create and use veneer as an inclusion of sustainable practices in woodworking. Skills such as bent laminations, tapered legs, mortise & tennon & blind dovetails are discussed. Typical project cost: \$100.

Prereq: CMGT 1220 or CMGT 1530.

Semester: Spring

## Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Learn safe operation & custom set-up of power equipment.
- Incorporate design principles related to solid wood construction on the skill building project.
- Introduced to the development of jigs, templates and other custom set-ups.
- Learn the proper procedures for cut-out & assembly of the assigned skill building project.
- Learn intermediate wood finishing techniques including sanding, scraping, coloring & top coating.
- Continue to design a skill building project of their own.

### **Engagement Plan**

### Required supplies:

- Ear plugs or other hearing protection (Standard earbuds or headphones are not protective enough.)
- Safety Glasses

### **Recommended tools/supplies:**

• 4" or 6" Double Square (recommended) or Combination Square in <u>4R graduations</u> (Important: 4R graduations will display measurements in increments of 8ths,

# 16ths, 32nds, and 64ths. Other graduations may be more difficult to use for our use cases.)

- 6" Stainless steel rule (4R graduations)
- 12' (or longer) Tape Measure. I find 12' to be plenty length and is more compact than longer tape measures.
- #2 wood Pencil or mechanical pencil
- Respirator or N95 Mask.
- Shop Apron. Many woodworkers, including myself, enjoy using a shop apron to hold the most frequently-used tools, such as all the tools listed above.

## Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

Every student will be building their own piece of furniture to take home at the end of the semester. Everyone will be building the same design at the same pace. This will allow us to build with more complexity and keep specific setups and work-holding implements since we can run many parts through the same setting one after another like a production line.
