Perspectives in Comm (HU)

COMM - 2050 501

Course Description

Survey of the basic issues, theories, and perspectives in the study of human communication, through critical analysis of oral, written and audio-visual texts. Effective Summer 2016, COMM 2050 will replace and is equivalent to COMM 1050.

Semesters: All

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Use various primary and secondary sources to critically analyze and evaluate authors' interpretations of human behavior (i.e. find the strengths and weakness of the interpretations).
- Identify and describe how different forces influence the creation of the various interpretations of human behavior (i.e. the current thinking of the time, cultural context, national and world events, firsthand experiences of the researchers and scholarship from various schools of thought).
- Describe and evaluate the background of several essential theories of human communication by the lens researchers use to explore human behavior (i.e. Interpretive lens, Social Scientific lens, Critical lens), by the Traditions in which the theories fit (i.e. Rhetoric, Semiotic, Socio-Cultural) and by the original source of the theory (i.e. the humanities, psychology, communication). Understand how the choices of "lens," "tradition" and "source" influence the way human behavior is interpreted.
- Make connections between past human behavior patterns and current human behavior patterns to help understand your own behavior choices.

- Apply various interpretations of human behavior to creatively problem-solve human behavior cases and effectively manage your behavior in your personal and professional life.
- Ethically use information and technology (i.e. identify primary and secondary sources, accurately cite resources used in research, state facts in context).
- Use contemporary technology to complete assignments, do research and navigate student systems.
- Use self-reflection to identify and evaluate your own beliefs and values and other influences in your life (i.e. your culture, national or world events, job experience, religious association) to improve your personal and professional communication.

- I will respond to email within 48 hours. I will offer feedback on major assignments within two weeks. The best way to contact me is via the Canvas Inbox, as I will prioritize this email over other modes of communication.
- In this course I will be posting interactive announcements which will offer specific opportunities for class questions and extra credit every other week.
- Additionally, I will be participating in the discussion forums with you to share my perspective within the discipline and to offer some nuances of interpretation that may not be present in your textbook when necessary.
- Lastly, you are welcome to ask questions via email or come to my office hours, where we can learn on some of the more difficult units within the course.

Regarding Al

In this course, students shall give credit to Al tools whenever used, even if only to generate ideas rather than usable text or illustrations. When using Al tools on assignments, add an appendix showing (a) the entire exchange, highlighting the most relevant sections; (b) a description of precisely which Al tools were used (e.g. ChatGPT private subscription version or DALL-E free version), (c) an explanation of how the Al tools were used (e.g. to generate ideas, turns of phrase, elements of text, long stretches of text, lines of argument, pieces of evidence, maps of the conceptual territory, illustrations of key concepts, etc.); (d) an account of why Al tools were used (e.g. to save time, to surmount writer's block, to stimulate thinking, to handle mounting stress, to clarify prose, to translate text, to experiment for fun, etc.). Students shall not use Al tools during quizzes and exams, or assignments unless explicitly permitted and instructed. Overall, Al tools should be used wisely and reflectively with an aim to deepen understanding of subject matter.
