Coursework & Assignment Descriptions

Course Activities

Through the following activities, you will demonstrate your mastery of the course content and college-wide learning outcomes. Each week you will complete:

Vocabulary quizzes test the important economic terms introduced in each chapter.

Chapter assignments and **discussions** are designed to focus on an important concept(s) from each chapter. These assignments may take a variety of formats requiring graphs, calculations, or written explanations. By working these assignments, you are developing

your knowledge of these concepts and preparing for the chapter quiz. Each multiple-choice **chapter quiz** covers one week of material.

A strong study technique is to make a summary sheet or study guide for each week's material. Then use this study guide and other course resources when you take the quiz. You are NOT to access general internet resources or other people when taking quizzes.

You will complete three comprehensive **projects**. These projects are designed to showcase your knowledge of microeconomic concepts and your ability to apply that knowledge in an organized and well-written report targeted at an audience that is unfamiliar with economic terminology. You will also reflect on your progress toward the general education outcomes and how your perspective on microeconomics has been impacted by our course.
