Course Description

Fundamentals of growth and development from preconception to old age and death are explored. The domains of physical, cognitive, and social-emotional growth for each age in the life cycle are explored in a variety of contexts.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

 Analyze the empirical and theoretical aspects of human development from birth through death based on diverse biosocial, cognitive, and psychosocial development.

- Discuss the complexity of human experience, the variety of institutions that humans construct, and how these relate to the issue of ageism.
- Identify the elements of effective communication through reading, writing, speaking, and listening to key concepts, significant topics, and social issues relevant to the study of the diversity of human development through the lifespan.
- Effectively communicate the relationship between values and attitudes and how these can influence individual and societal perceptions of the ages and stages of human development.
- Interpret systematic methods of collecting data relevant to the fields of sociology, psychology, and biology as they understand human behavior in both individual and collective dimensions.
- Choose and apply appropriate analytical techniques to evaluate observations as they pertain to human development across the lifespan.
- Systematically analyze, synthesize, and evaluate personal and dynamic relationships found among/in individuals, groups, social institutions, and the environment, relevant to the process of aging.
- Compare and contrast ideas from society, the scientific community, and various other disciplines by evaluating claims, arguments and widely held beliefs about human interaction throughout the lifespan.
- Explain the impact of current legislation, court rulings, and legal parameters that affect the human condition.
- Describe individuals' rights to receive equitable treatment and services through the life span.

Coursework & Assignment Descriptions

Chapter Quizzes

For each chapter in the textbook, a Study Guide lists the Main Ideas that students should understand. Each chapter quiz contains 25 questions on those Main Ideas. Quizzes are closed-book and will require the LockDown Browser software. Each quiz must be taken in one sitting, but the quiz is not timed, so students may take as much time as they want to complete the quiz. You will complete Chapter Quizzes for 6 out of the 10 chapters in the course, though you are encouraged to take the remaining 4 quizzes, as practice, since the Final Exam questions come from the Chapter Quizzes. Lifeline: Canvas will count the top 6 scores and drop the lowest 4 scores/zeros.

Case Studies

Case Studies teach you to connect course concepts to real-world scenarios (either an observation video or a written scenario) during the different lifespan stages that we will be studying. You will complete Case Studies for 4 of the life stages we will study. Lifeline: Canvas will count the top 4 scores and drop the lowest 2 scores/zeros.

Reflections

These assignments are designed to deepen your understanding of the course concepts by engaging in a structured deep-dive interaction with AI (Copilot), where you will apply course concepts, explore your thinking, respond to different perspectives, and practice effective communication. You will complete Reflections for 6 out of the 10 chapters in the course. Lifeline: Canvas will count the top 6 scores and drop the lowest 4 scores/zeros.

Signature Assignment (Lifespan Interview)

As part of SLCC's General Education program, this assignment helps you demonstrate key General Education learning outcomes: Critical Thinking and Effective Communication.

This assignment builds on the skills you'll develop in the Case Studies, especially your ability to connect real-world experiences to developmental theories and concepts.

You will conduct a recorded interview with a person who is in Middle Adulthood or Late Adulthood, exploring their experiences at the different lifespan stages and across the three domains of development. You will then analyze their experiences in light of the concepts we have studied this semester.

Final Exam

The Final Exam is cumulative, meaning that it will cover content from the entire semester. However, all questions come directly from Chapter Quizzes, with one randomly-selected question on each of the Main Ideas from the semester. Students may take the Final Exam up to three times and will receive the highest of the scores.

Discussions, Participation, and Attendance

Students will interact with one another on a regular basis. Online sections will do so using online discussion boards, while in-person sections will do so using in-class activities. Students are expected to be fully-present during class. Participation points will be reduced for students who are distracted, who are not participating, who are working on other things, etc.

___% of your grade: Extra Credit

There are three types of Extra Credit in this class. Together, they can significantly help you. The Extra Credit consists of:

- Lifelines: See above.
- Bonus Point: A 1% Bonus Point boost will be given to students who submit an anonymous Course Evaluation at the end of the semester. Instructions are posted on the Bonus Point assignment page.

• Modified Curve: Final grades will be based on a "modified curve." The top grade in the class will be boosted up to 100%, and every student in the class will receive the same number of "curve" points. For example, if the top grade at the end of the semester is 98.3%, then every student will receive a 1.7% adjustment to their grade.

Engagement Plan

What you can expect of me in this course:

- I will return messages within one SLCC business day. (Please plan ahead.) The best way to contact me is via the Canvas Inbox, as I will prioritize this email over other modes of communication.
- Assignments will be graded within one week of the due date.
- I will do my best to help you however I can.

What I expect of you:

- Log on and participate in the course at least 3-4 times throughout the week. Refer to the Time Commitment information below for how much time you should be spending on this course.
- Read each announcement that I post. They contain important information, and you will be responsible for understanding that information.

Time Commitment:

This is a 3-credit hour course. A "credit hour" is the amount of time (including classroom time, if applicable) that a student is expected to take for their class.

Each credit hour should take 45 hours during the semester (http://www.slcc.edu/policies/docs/c4s02-10.pdf, p. 4), so a 3-credit hour class like this should take you a total of 135 total hours this semester. That breaks down to the following number of hours per week, on average:

Due Dates and Deadlines

Due Dates

All assignments are due at 11:59 p.m. Mountain Time on the listed due date. If you are outside of Mountain Time Zone, for any reason during the semester, be sure to adjust accordingly. Example: An assignment due Saturday at 11:59 p.m. Mountain Time will be due at 10:59 p.m. Pacific Time if you are in California that weekend.

Late Work

Late work will be accepted with a deduction of 10% per day (0.04% per hour), but please note that Canvas is a computer so it is very strict about the 11:59 p.m. deadline and will round up to the next whole hour block. In other words, if an assignment is due at 11:59 on

Tuesday and you turn it in at 12:05 a.m. on Wednesday, Canvas will count that as one hour late. I will score the assignment just like any other student's work, and then Canvas will reduce the score by 0.04% per hour.

Finals Week

The Final Exam schedule is set by the College so that each class has a protected two-hour block for the final exam. See https://www.slcc.edu/schedule/final-exam-schedule.aspx. Do not schedule events/travel/etc. during Finals Week. You will not be able to take the Final early.

Unusual Circumstances: Due Date Extensions and Incomplete Grades

The course Lifelines give you enough flexibility that if something unexpected occurs, you can skip an assignment without it impacting your grade. These Lifelines protect students in the vast majority of cases.

However, sometimes there are more serious or prolonged situations that are beyond your control and that prevent you from completing your coursework. When that happens, I reserve the right to allow due-date extensions, which I will do as fairly and equitably as possible, Important: Please talk to me as soon as possible if something significant comes up; delaying almost always makes it harder to adapt to the circumstances. Students will need to provide documentation of the circumstances to qualify for an extension.

When unusual circumstances like this come near the end of the semester, the College allows a student to finish the coursework after the end of the semester. See the "Incomplete Grades" section of the College's Grade and Grading Policies webpage.

Academic Integrity, Plagiarism, and A.I.

Your assignments are designed to help you show what you understand and what you have learned. If you use someone else's work without saying so, it becomes difficult for your teacher to know how well you are doing and how best to support your learning.

Technology

Canvas

The Canvas site will be your hub for the course. All materials, announcements, instructions, and grades will be posted on Canvas and, for consistency and record-keeping, assignments must be submitted through the assignment page in Canvas (not by email).

If this is your first time using Canvas, take time early in the semester to explore the site thoroughly. It is your responsibility to know how to navigate Canvas and complete required steps.

Office 365

You will use Office 365 for creating/editing written assignments. Assignments that are created and/or edited outside of the shared folder will not be graded and will receive a score of zero. Instructions for setting up a class folder are posted on Canvas.

LockDown Browser

You will use the Lockdown Browser for all of your quizzes. Instructions for installing the software is posted in the Getting Started module on Canvas.

If you do not have the necessary equipment to use the LockDown Browser, you must notify me within the first week of class to make other arrangements.
