Intermediate Film Production

FLM - 1055 001

Course Description

An intensive workshop experience in which students complete pre-production building toward a final project which they will cast, staff, and shoot, producing a 15 to 20 minute short film. Required for film majors.

Prereq: FLM 1045.

Semester: Fall & Spring

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Students will demonstrate the following film production competencies: Industry standard cinema camera building and operation, including use of lenses, follow focus, and matte box; intermediate film lighting theory and equipment; grip and electric responsibilities; Sync-sound production audio; post-production skills including dialogue editing and sound mixing, and color correction.
- Students will fill roles such as director, cinematographer, sound recordist/mixer, camera assistant, grip, & gaffer.
- Students will demonstrate the ability to work together on large group projects as a crew (in-class and out-of-class), which includes pre-production planning, casting, scripting, shot-listing, lighting, shooting, and performing post-production. Students will assume the responsibilities as assistant editor, editor, sound designer, colorist, and director.



Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

MIDTERM AND FINAL EXAM

Exams will be given in class and will be on the readings and lectures. Exams are multiplechoice.

Students who cannot attend the final on the designated date will have to determine if they can pass the class without taking the final or should consider not taking the class. If student cannot take the exam on the exam dates, the student must inform the teacher BEFORE the date of the exam. If the student does not show up on the day of the exam without at least a 24-hour prior agreement, the student will not be able to take the exam. There will be no exceptions. Final Movie 4 to 6-minute movie description: The final project will be a 4 to 6-minute film. The film should contain elements using the 3-act story structure, implementing use of dialogue, lighting and sound effects & mixing, including foley, and music. No guns, knives or weapons. No dangerous stunts. No illegal locations etc. Make your credits quick and simple as to not distract from the story. The project will be graded on the story, preproduction management, storyboard, cinematography, lighting, acting, direction, and editing. The project will be edited as a group, each student taking on roles such as: assistant editor, editor, sound mixer, & colorist. Music must come from royalty free

websites, Soundtrack Pro, or "cleared original music". NO COMMERCIAL MUSIC can be used without written permission!
