Film Directing 1

FLM - 2015 001

Course Description

This course teaches film directing techniques and theory. Students will write direct and produce their own narrative short film. Students will explore film terminology, language and grammar; and story structure and basic acting theory. Students will learn how to manage actors and crew, and produce a complex and creative work of art.

Prerequisite(s): FLM 1045, FLM 1055, or instructor approval.

Semester(s): Fall & Spring

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Design, produce and create an original, narrative short film.
- Implement proper use of film language, screen grammar and related terminology.
- Assemble a cast and crew, and practice effectively communicating their vision with a variety of departments and roles, including cinematographers, assistant directors and designers.
- Develop collaboratively together on group projects (in-class and out-of-class), which includes scripting, storyboarding, designing, shooting and editing, mixing and producing.
- Identify the history of directing in film production.

Engagement Plan

Example language:

- I will respond to email within 48 hours. I will offer feedback on major assignments within 2 weeks. The best way to contact me is via the Canvas Inbox, as I will prioritize this email over other modes of communication.
- In this course I will be posting interactive announcements which will offer specific opportunities for class questions and extra credit every other week.
- Additionally, I will be participating in the discussion forums with you to share my perspective within the discipline and to offer some nuances of interpretation that may not be present in your textbook.

Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

The main assignment is creating your short film and working on other student's short films. A successful and completed short film is required to pass this class.

3-10 minute movie: The final project will be a 3-10 minute film, written, produced, directed and editing by each student. The film should contain elements using the 3-act story structure, lighting and sound effects & mixing, including foley, and music. No dangerous stunts. No illegal locations etc. The project will be graded on the story, pre-production management, storyboard, cinematography, lighting, acting, direction, and editing. Music must come from royalty free websites, or "cleared original music". NO COMMERCIAL MUSIC!!

Films will be edited the following semester by the Advance Editing class. Your participation in the post process next semester is encouraged regardless of enrollment status.

3-10 Minute Movie Producer/ 1st AD- Student will act as Producer during Pre-production and 1st AD during filming for another student's film. Producer will create and turn in a digital Production Binder, containing: Marked Script, Schedule, Call Sheet, Daily Production Report, Actor and Crew Releases, and Credit List.
