World Regional Geography

GEOG - 1300 003

Course Description

The purpose of this course is to focus on the cultural and geopolitical regions of the world. This includes the introduction and analysis of historical and current cultural, geopolitical, economic, and environmental issues in relation to these specific regions of the world.

Semester: All

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Apply the technology used to measure and analyze natural processes, such as satellite imagery, aerial photography, geographic information systems (GIS), global positioning systems (GPS), and other forms of scientific data.
- Demonstrate proficiency in the essentials of geography: spatial thinking, distribution patterns, and interrelationships; methodology; mapping analysis; geospatial technology.
- Compare and contrast various regions of the world physically, culturally, politically, etc. in order to determine what gives regions their uniqueness and commonality with other regions.
- Analyze geographic patterns and distributions of various cultural features across the earth (i.e. political divisions, religion, economics, industry, religion, language, agriculture, and demographics).
- Determine how culture, ethnicity, and religion all influence and influence regions around the world.
- Analyze the impact of limited natural resources and the potential conflicts at a local, regional, state, and international level.

• Understand how globalization is affecting various regions of the world.

Your grade is based on the work you do, not the work that you don't do. So, please do all the work and hand it in on time.

Please monitor your scores in the Canvas Grade book, particularly as we approach the end of the semester to make sure you get the points that you earned. Many times mistakes can be made by me in scoring your work, so please check your scores regularly and report any discrepancies to me as soon as possible so adjustments can be made.

The **purpose of Discussions** is to foster the exchange of information, ideas, questions, and sharing opinions on what you thought were interesting in the Module studied between you and other members of the class. Talking with each other about a certain

topic or subject facilitates learning, and since we don't have a face-to-face opportunity to talk to each other, the next best thing is the use what is called the discussion forum technique. Students are expected to provide an initial response post, which constitutes the initial post that is due on the due date (for full credit your initial response must be submitted by the due date). Then students are given a few days to respond to one or two peer depending on what the Discussion requires within the time that the Discussion assignment is available to you. Once the availability date runs out, then there will not be any further opportunity to do work on the Discussion assignment. Therefore, it is important that you are cognizant of the due and availability dates of the assignment. Also, be sure you read the instructions carefully and comply with them for full credit.

Coursework

Textbook

The textbooks for this course, Introduction to World Regional Geography (Links to an external site.), and the Applied World Regional GeographyLinks to an external site. are Creative Commons textbooks, which means that all of the content has been written and compiled by the Geosciences Department and made available to you at no additional cost.

Chapter Quizzes

The chapter quizzes will assess your understanding of the textbook chapters. The quizzes are composed of multiple-choice and multiple-answer questions. You will have 30 minutes to complete the quiz. You will also be allowed to take it twice, with the higher of the two quizzes counting for your score.

Assignments

Each assignment is designed to have you analyze the spatial and temporal patterns of the physical and cultural environments. Some of the activities will be using the new Google Earth (Links to an external site.); other assignments will have you using a webbased geographic information system, called ArcGIS Online (Links to an external site.). The assignments are not timed and in quiz form, for you to submit your answers easily.

Exams

A total of 3 exams will be given for the course. The exams will consist of 30-50 randomly selected questions. You will have 90 minutes to complete the exam and will be allowed to take the exam twice. The higher of the two scores will count for your score. Those exams will be completed within Canvas.

ePortfolio.

to put at least one signature assignment from the course into your ePortfolio and accompany it with reflective writing.
