Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Make cross-cultural connections by comparing and contrasting the values and artifacts of diverse cultures.
- Communicate independent, critical, and creative thinking about cultural artifacts.
- Identify artistic works according to genre, time period, and style.
- Describe how the diversity of human experience affects the way each individual experiences the world.
- Reflect on personal thought processes, opinions, and biases in regards to various cultures and ideas.
- Synthesize current political, historical, economic, religious, and sociological events or ideas to create an artistic work.
- Develop the knowledge and skills to be civically engaged, and/or work with others in a professional and constructive manner.

How to Succeed in the Course

There may be many aspects of this course that firmly displace you from your comfort zone. You will cover themes of a disturbing nature, such as, death, war, violence etc... You may also be exposed to themes and work that contain nudity, swearing or themes of an adult nature. I would ask for your respect and maturity when confronted with this content. These pieces of work have been chosen for the inherent message they contain, not to

shock or offend. Please see it as an academic exercise and be ready to embrace things which you may not have previously encountered.

Above all I expect RESPECT for everyone's opinion, for the instructor, and for the material covered in the course. You may be exposed to cultures and belief systems which you have not previously been exposed to. You may have preconceived ideas and notions that govern your perception of certain racial or religious groups. I would ask that you do not judge anyone in the class based on their cultural / ethnic / religious / gender related experience or opinions. I ask that you open your mind and enthusiastically enter into valuable debate online and when studying the assigned texts, movies, sound bites etc... Debate is an integral component of this course of study. We do not need to necessarily agree, but we do need to create an environment in which everyone feels comfortable to express an opinion or ask a question. I do not want you to use the fact that you are online as an excuse to say inappropriate things or be disrespectful to other students or the instructor. Anyone who makes inappropriate comments or disrespects a class member or the instructor will be graded accordingly.

This is an online course. It is organized around nine "Learning Modules" or "Themes" each with its own set of readings, exercises, assignments, and assessments. Details are listed on the Course Content home page and at the opening of each module. Each Module is broken into topics. Complete the assignments in the order given and by the due dates assigned. Do not try to take assessments before you have completed all preceding assignments.

THIS COURSE IS NOT EASY just because it is online. In fact, it may be more difficult than a face to face course because it relies on you to manage your schedule for completing assignments and requires more reading. If you want to truly learn, rather than merely get a degree, you have to be willing to work at your education. This class requires 9 hours per week minimum. If you don't have the time, don't take the class. However, if you

quit you are failing to take advantage of a great educational opportunity. If you decide to withdraw from the class make sure you do so through the Office of the Registrar and Academic Records or you will receive an "E" for the course and have to do extra work to get that taken off your transcript. This online course has the same number/quality of assignments and requires the same work as an on-campus class.

There will be considerable reading in this class. Most of the course readings will come from your textbook which is embedded within the course. Finally, I'll also direct you to various websites and online readings, sound files, and videos that give us other windows into how the humanities utilize various media.

Late work is not accepted. All assignments in this course have a due date after which you will no longer be able to submit your responses. Pay careful attention to these dates so you ensure that your work is up-to-date and complete. Check the syllabus often and make sure that you are aware of all due dates so that you do not miss turning in assignments.

Engagement Plan

- I will typically respond to email within two weekdays. I will grade
 assignments utilizing individual assignment rubrics typically within two
 weeks of submission. The best way to contact me is through the
 Canvas Messaging, as I will prioritize this method over other modes of
 communication.
- Throughout the course, students will be afforded the opportunity to contribute discussion responses and actively engage in discourse with their peers on a range of topics within the Humanities.

This course uses the Canvas course management system. All students must use Canvas to retrieve course readings, access web pages, upload assignments, receive course announcements, and review the class section's syllabus.

Coursework & Assignment Descriptions

Journals

Description: Every week you will have 1-2 journal assignments to submit in the Canvas course. Journal assignments offer students a space to reflect, analyze, and express their thoughts on course material, readings, and personal experiences. These assignments provide an opportunity for students to engage in introspective writing and critical thinking. Journal entries will be structured around a variety of prompts. Journal assignments are a minimum of 400 words. In-text citations are mandatory to acknowledge the information you use from various sources, including the textbook.

Points: 16 pts.

Percentage of Final Grade: 30%

Discussions

Description: At the end of each Module there is a Module Discussion. Discussions in this course serve as a virtual platform for students to engage in thoughtful conversations about a variety of topics. These discussions provide an opportunity for students to share their insights, perspectives, and interpretations of the course material. Students can post their thoughts, respond to their classmates' comments, and engage in dialogue that deepens their understanding of the subject matter.

Discussions are structured around specific prompts and are a minimum of 200 words. In-text citations are mandatory to acknowledge the information you use from various sources, including the textbook.

Points: 16 pts.

Percentage of Final Grade: 20%

Quizzes

Description: At the end of each Module there will be a quiz covering a variety of content from the Module. Quizzes are assessments designed to test students' understanding of the content of each Module. These quizzes serve as a valuable tool for instructors to evaluate students' knowledge and comprehension of the material. Quizzes will be presented in multiple choice format.

Points: 5 pts.

Percentage of Final Grade: 10%

Major Assignments

Description: There are three Major Assignments throughout the Canvas Course. Major assignments are substantial projects that require students to demonstrate their critical thinking, research, analytical, and creative skills in relation to the course content. These assignments are designed to deepen students' understanding of the humanities disciplines, such as art, literature, philosophy, history, and culture. Major assignments in Canvas Humanities courses offer students the opportunity to delve deeply into a subject of interest, develop their academic writing skills, and showcase their knowledge and creativity. These assignments play a critical role in assessing students' mastery of course material and their ability to engage critically with the humanities disciplines.

Percentage of Final Grade: 20%

Signature Assignment

Description: At the end of the course you will complete you Signature Assignment, My Manifesto. Signature assignments represent the pinnacle of a student's academic journey, showcasing their comprehensive understanding, critical thinking skills, and mastery of the course material. This assignment integrates various elements of the course, requiring students to synthesize their knowledge from different perspectives, reflect on their understanding of the humanities and themselves, analyze complex issues, and demonstrate originality in their work.

Points: 100 pts.

Percentage of Final Grade: 20%

For all written assignments, students must include both in-text citations and full references to receive credit for using the textbook. Incorporating information from the textbook is a required criterion on the rubric for every written assignment. If you need guidance on how to properly cite sources, please refer to the Module titled "Plagiarism, Citations, & Formatting."
