Course Description

A review of the theories of color and applications as they relate to the psychological impact of color in residential and commercial settings.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Students will demonstrate a substantive knowledge of the basic principles of color in interior design. Including but not limited to: the function and relevance of color, basic knowledge of color theory, physics of light, and the color rendition of various lamps.
- Students will exhibit the knowledge of proper industry terminology which will allow them to communicate effectively with other similarly engaged professionals.
- Student will exhibit professionalism through high quality presentations; effective sales techniques; efficient organization; and work cooperatively with clients and coworkers.

Supplies:

For the first 2 assignments, acrylic paint and supplies are required. There are many online or in store for purchasing. The links here are to Blick Art Supplies. I will also have supplies available in the classroom for students to use. However, I always suggest purchasing your own as they come in handy throughout this program and in your professional career.

Paint and supplies for the first 2 assignments:

 Acrylic artist quality paint: Red, Yellow, Blue, Black and White. This link is to a <u>Blick</u> <u>Set</u> that has all the colors.

- (1) <u>Bristol Paper Pad</u>
- Flat Paint Brush: 1/2" to 1"
- 1 Hot Press board for presentation. No poster board. Link.
- Other supplies as needed at home to paint the color swatches. I find a pallet knife or popsicle stick helpful to mix the paint.

Drafting and rendering supplies for the floor plan for the final project: *Note: If you have had INTD 1010 or INTD 1100, you should have the drafting supplies already.

- Architectural Scale. There are many versions, here is one example: <u>link.</u>
- 1/4" Furniture template. <u>Link.</u>
- One or 2 sheets of vellum paper. You can get a pad like <u>this</u>. Or a roll like <u>this</u> will also work.
