



Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

ASSIGNMENTS: All assignments, due dates, and specific instructions are found on Canvas in the Modules. Spelling, grammatical, and punctuation errors can affect your grade. **Late work is not accepted and will receive zero points.** If there are extenuating circumstances why your work is going to be late, you must let me know BEFORE the assignment is due if possible. It is up to the instructor's discretion to accept late work.

EXAMS AND QUIZZES: Quizzes cover the material from the last quiz up through the material being covered the day of the quiz. Students can miss one exam per class per semester and the points from that exam will not factor into their final grade. If they miss additional exams, they will get a zero on that exam. The classroom door will be locked when exams start. Anyone arriving to class late will not be allowed to take the exam. When students are done with an exam or quiz, they can stay at their desk doing something that does not involve using a device (computer, tablet, cell phone, etc.) or they can leave the classroom. If they leave, they cannot come back in until everyone has

finished the exam or quiz so as not to disrupt those still taking the exam. Quiz and exam results will be locked until the class period is over. Missed quizzes cannot be made up. The midterm and final exams are ONLY given on the scheduled days. Questions will be derived from the textbook, lecture, class discussions, and material on Canvas.

Accommodated Testing

Academic Integrity

Plagiarism, which can include the use of generative artificial intelligence, is the writing equivalent of stealing or passing off another's work as your own.
