- Discuss the importance of obtaining permission to perform any restorative procedure.
- Analyze photographs for restorative reconstruction.
- Explain facial proportions and how they relate to the natural form of the facial features and facial restoration.
- Identify and locate the major bony structures of the skull and explain how each influence surface forms.
- Identify and locate the major muscles of the face and explain how each influences surface form and expression.
- Classify and explain the principles of pigments, and their relation to cosmetic compounds.
- Classify and explain the principles of illumination.
- Describe the selection of correct colorants to achieve a natural appearance under varied conditions.

Generative AI Policy: Generative artificial intelligence (AI) software (e.g., ChatGPT) is a rapidly emerging tool that students may be interested in using. However, I am interested in reading your thoughts and opinions.
