# Med Surg Nurs Clinical III

### Course Description

Builds upon knowledge application from NRSG 2305. Fosters professionalism and collaboration with continued development of clinical judgment based on patient centered care and evidence-based practice to achieve safe, quality care through simulated scenarios and clinical based situations that correspond to health alterations learned in NRSG 2400.

Pre-Requisite(s): Completion of prior semester courses per established curriculum plan.

### Keys for Success (how to succeed in the course)

- 2. Come prepared, complete pre-lab videos, quiz and case study.
- 3. You must attend all simulations to pass. Students that have an unexcused absence from a scheduled clinical or lab will be put on a Performance Plan. A second unexcused absences from a scheduled clinical or lab will result in a failure of the Clinical Judgement course and the corresponding theory course
- 4. You will be working in teams throughout the semester, you have the opportunity to select your team members (4-6/group).
- 5. Communicate with your instructors and each other. It takes a cohesive team to care for your simulated patients.
- 6. Channel your inner detective (utilize the clinical judgement model) as you work through these simulations. You will be surprised how much you know.
- 7. Have fun and learn.

### Brief Description of Assignments/Exams

- Successful completion of 6 in person simulations is required to pass this class.
   Each
  - simulation will focus on frequently encountered high acuity conditions. There will be make-up and remediation days available (60% of grade).
  - Quizzes: Most modules will have a graded quiz that needs to be completed prior to lab. These quizzes are designed to prepare you for the simulation. Multiple attempts are allowed for each quiz (15% of grade).
- Assignments: Consist of Case Studies and priority exercises, see Canvas (15% of grade).
- Professionalism (10% of grade).
