## Course Student Learning Outcomes

- Demonstrate basic knowledge of how to make and complete a variety of craft projects including ceramics, leather crafts, woodworking, needlework, yarn work, quilting, paper crafts etc.
- Demonstrate personal safety with tool use, area management, and cleanup.
- Lead group treatment on a self-selected minimal cost craft using leisure participation as the occupational area.
- Document peer client progress using a graded model of note writing in a SOAP (subjective, objective, assessment, plan) note format.
- Demonstrate in writing a common thread between a goal, treatment, and planned treatment based on peer client and real client progress.
- Apply therapeutic use of self in verbal and nonverbal communication with peer clients and real clients.
- Effectively teach individuals and/or groups selected crafts.
- Write reflections and assignment requirements professionally with correct spelling, grammar, acronyms succinctly with brevity yet clarity reflecting comprehensive completeness.
- Use principles of time management in temporally planning for and completing group and individual projects.
- Effectively use English and metric measurements to plan projects, adapt sizing and measuring correctly.
- Document patient progress using quantitative standards such as # of repetitions, variation of size, time measures, etc.
- Utilize correct procedure in care, storage, maintenance, and return of supplies and equipment.

- Demonstrate ability to grade difficulty of activity to promote increase in physical, cognitive and/or psychosocial function congruent with disability prognosis.
- Demonstrate ability to read and follow patterns, written and verbal directions.
- Effectively teach individuals and/or groups selected craft techniques.
- Effectively utilize reflection as a learning tool in planning and organizing group treatment activities.
- Research community nonprofit agencies that may benefit from receipt of the craft projects and participate in the donation.
- Simulate a disability professionally and respectfully during group work.
- Lead a group using time management, sharp observation skills, and adaptations for constructive success of co-students.
- Co-mentor and assist classmate learning as needed during fabrications and note writing.
- Work cooperatively while sharing equipment, supplies, and turn-taking to complete craft projects.
- Participate equally in the distribution of the service project to a community agency.
- Use computer software or websites to effectively augment craft project learning.
- Submit via an e-portfolio a clear and concise description, a picture, and thorough reflection of each personal craft fabricated.
- Submit via an e-portfolio the agency of craft donation, how the donation will be used by the agency, and a digital picture.

\*Students must achieve minimum competency of skills in all courses and assignments as outlined in each course syllabi and assignment. Students who fail a quiz or exam will be required to retake it once. If the student does not pass the retake at 75%, the student will be placed on academic probation. If the student passes the retake, the original quiz grade will stand on cumulative grading for that course. If a student cannot pass a midterm or final exam with at least a C (75%) for minimum competency, the instructor for the course has the right to require a student to complete a retake or parallel exam so the student can demonstrate competency of the material. The final grade for the course is determined by

the total number of points achieved by the student. As noted above the first score of a quiz or other exam is calculated. In order to pass the course, the student needs to achieve 75% of the total points available.
